BOARD OF RELIEF Make Necessary Changes In Lists of Assessors. The members of the board of relief have completed their labors for the present year, have made all necessary additions and deductions, and have arrived at the net grand list for the year ending on March 1st. The largest deduction from the assessor's list was \$700 in favor of Miss Gertrude Rogers. The assessors put her down as the owner of two automobiles, but she had only one and a recent \$700 was taken from her list by the board of relief. The assessors had taken the Standard Oil Co. with an oil supply of \$650. This was not done and the company was accordingly released from payment of same. \$300 were charged up by the assessors against Sophia H. Cheney for an automobile. This amount the assessors after investigation eliminated. The assessors had placed in the lists against Elizabeth J. Galloway, one dwelling house \$200, one building lot \$200 and one barn \$100, making a total of \$500. The board of relief found that these assessments should not be charged as above and they were consequently removed. The sum of \$250 was assessed on William J. Maguire for a house alleged to be a century old. The board of relief removed this item. Jennie D. Norton was assessed \$100 for a mill which she had sold. It was released from the list. Robert Campbell had \$75 charged against him for a piano. This was withdrawn by the board of relief. It will be seen by the above that there were seven deductions made from the lists of the assessors, totaling \$2,400. As an offset to above, additions were made to the lists as presented by the assessors in the following particular: Fred Sarncant, \$200; Mrs. J. P. Campbell, \$100; total \$300. Total additional \$71.50, total \$371.50. Tony Bass \$100 for building lots, ten per cent. additional \$10, total \$110, making the entire additions to the grand list \$886.50.

SPECIAL DEFENSE BOARDS DISSOLVED Their Work to Be Done by a General Board of Review. Washington, Feb. 25.—Five special defense boards, which were organized by department orders. The work which these special boards previously have done will hereafter be directed by a general board of review, composed of from five to seven officers on detail in Washington, who will from time to time make recommendations regarding the country's defenses. The membership of this board has not yet been determined by Secretary Garrison. In addition to the recommendations which the board of review may make from time to time, department commanders will be authorized to make their own suggestions as to the defense needs of their respective jurisdictions. The special boards which have been ordered to discontinue are the national land defense board, which has been charged with looking to the proper protection of the land approaches of coast defenses; the Cape Henry defense board, the Long Island sound defense board, the Panama Canal defense board, and the Florida defense board.

FLOOD KILLS FOUR MEN Others Narrowly Escape Death in Rush of Ice and Water. Four men were killed and ten others seriously injured in a rush of ice and water which swept down the river. The amount of water was so great that a swimming crew was unable to retrieve the bodies of the drowned. The White Mountain division of the Boston and Maine railroad in the town of North Ferrisburgh, N.H., was the scene of the tragedy. Henry L. Wheeler, the foreman of the crew, was one of those killed. The names of the other three who were drowned are not known. The bodies were washed under the heavy ice and swept out of sight down stream. No finding was the fish of water that most of the boats were with the driver. Helena surmised that they might be talking about her and she stepped down from the platform. Two men were seen to be struggling in the Whooled river, near Mount Peter, while dynamite was being exploded. Helm, falling for thirty-six hours in Montpelier, has caused great damage, and the amount of damage is high. Property loss in towns along the Whooled is estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars. The city is threatened with total destruction because of damage to the power plant. A general Vermont traffic has been halted by numerous washouts. There have been several washouts on the Boston and Maine and some north of Woodsville is impossible. Telephone service is cut off.

The young couples were then given ample opportunity to get acquainted. Music, song games and social intercourses rounded out the festivities of a very joyous event.
