

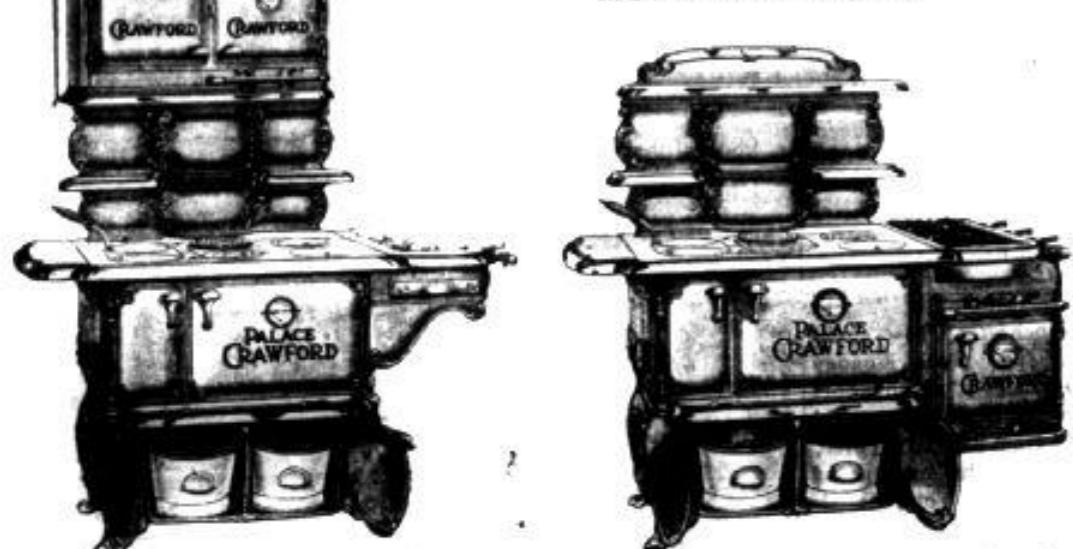

Tonight's the Night

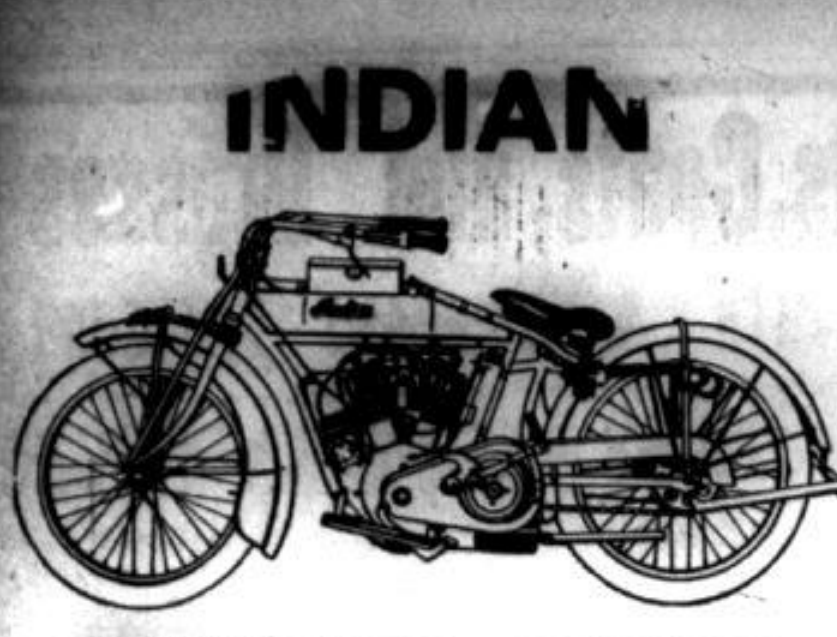

Prohibition Rally

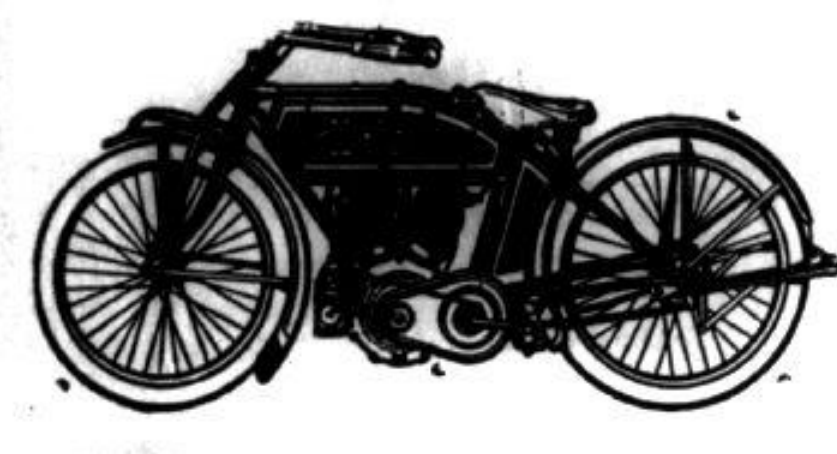
