A benefit entertainment for the High School Athletic Association is to take place at High School Hall Friday evening, May 14.

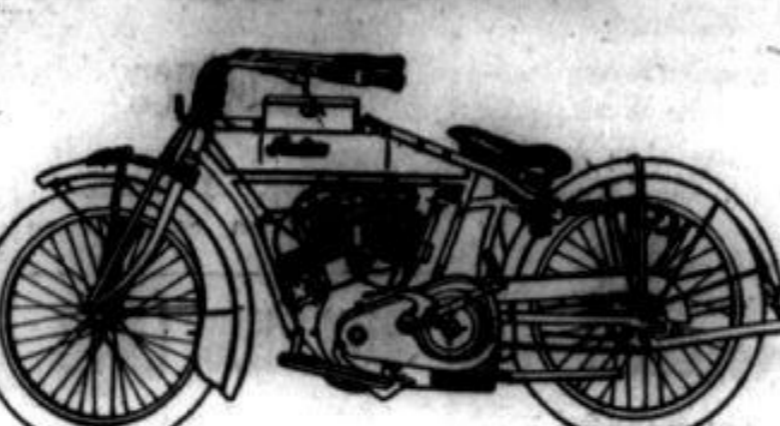

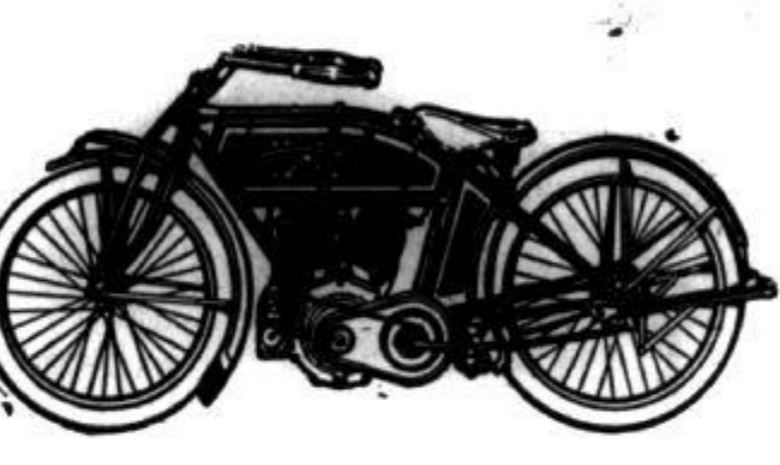

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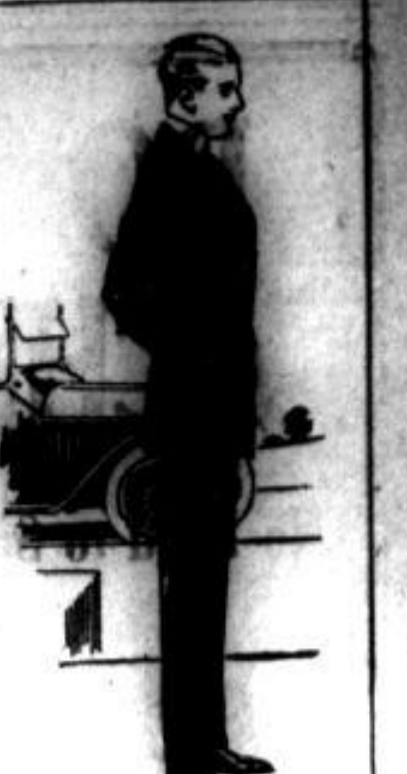
