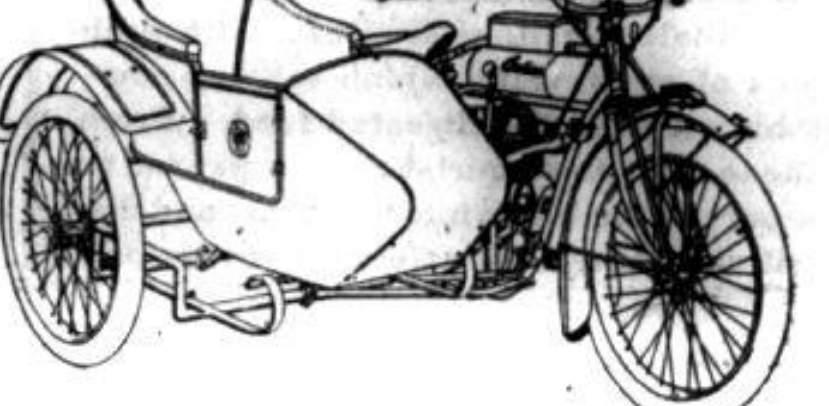
Local Paragraphs

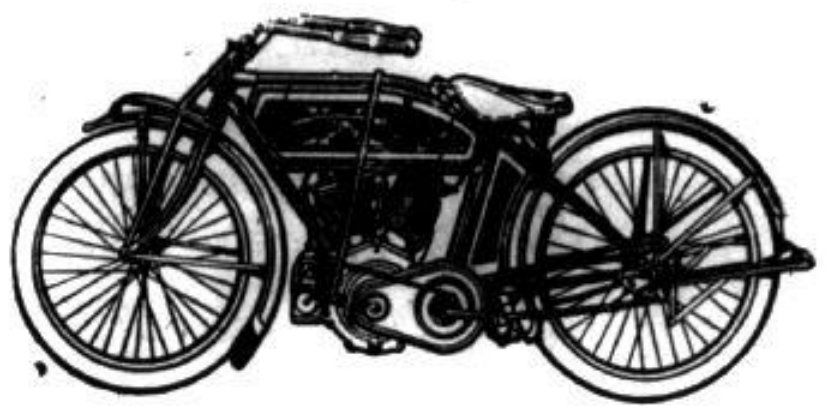

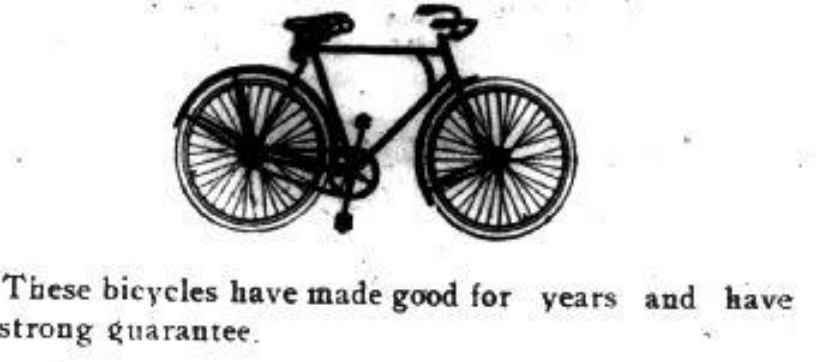
