Bacteria from 500,000 to 1,000,000 per c. c. indicates milk of bad quality. Bacteria over 1,000,000 per c. c. indicates milk of very bad quality. When milk contains over 500,000 per c. c. it indicates that conditions are atisfactory and should be inspected. The milk is usually too warm or has Refractometer reading under 36 indicates watered milk.

In reporting dirt by percentage an arbitrary scale is used in which 100 per cent. clean indicates no dirt. Milk drawn and shipped under clean con-
