FIGHTING INSOMNIA.

Some Advice About How to Win "Nature's Sweet Restorant"

In fighting insomnia I have found nothing so helpful as a simple good nature based on the conditions which recent psychological experiment has proved to be fundamental to sleep. These are:

Mental and muscular relaxation, limitation of voluntary movement and monotony of sensation. To obtain these the next time you find yourself wakeful select on the wall of your room some ornament or spot which by reason of a ray of light from the moon or street lamp, seems to stand out clearly from its surroundings. Having selected this spot, assume a comfortable position in bed, taking care that you lie in such a way that you can see the spot of your own mind without straining any part of your body.

Next, remaining perfectly motionless and thinking of nothing but the spot on the wall, gaze at it through half closed lids in such a way that it seems remote and indistinct. Be sure not to try to get a full view of it. That would mean tension, no relaxation, and would defeat your purpose. Keep eye on the spot while steady, must be without any straining of the attention.

Should you have continued to be perfectly quiet and to think of nothing but the spot on the wall, you will find your eyelids grow heavy and close open. Open them half way, as before, and resume the process of gazing. They will again grow heavy and close when by reason of a ray of light from the moon or street lamp, seems to stand out clearly from its surroundings. Having selected this spot, assume a comfortable position in bed, taking care that you lie in such a way that you can see the spot of your own mind without straining any part of your body.

Even if your room be in total darkness you can still make use of this sleep bringing method by calling up before your mind's eye some imaginary object and gazing at it between half closed lids exactly as though it were really before you. Remember, however, that you must be perfectly still, moving neither your hands nor your legs.

Try this device the next time you are troubled by wakefulness. From personal experience I am sure that, if you follow it faithfully in its details, you will find that it works like a charm.—H. Adlington Bruce in Kansas City Times.

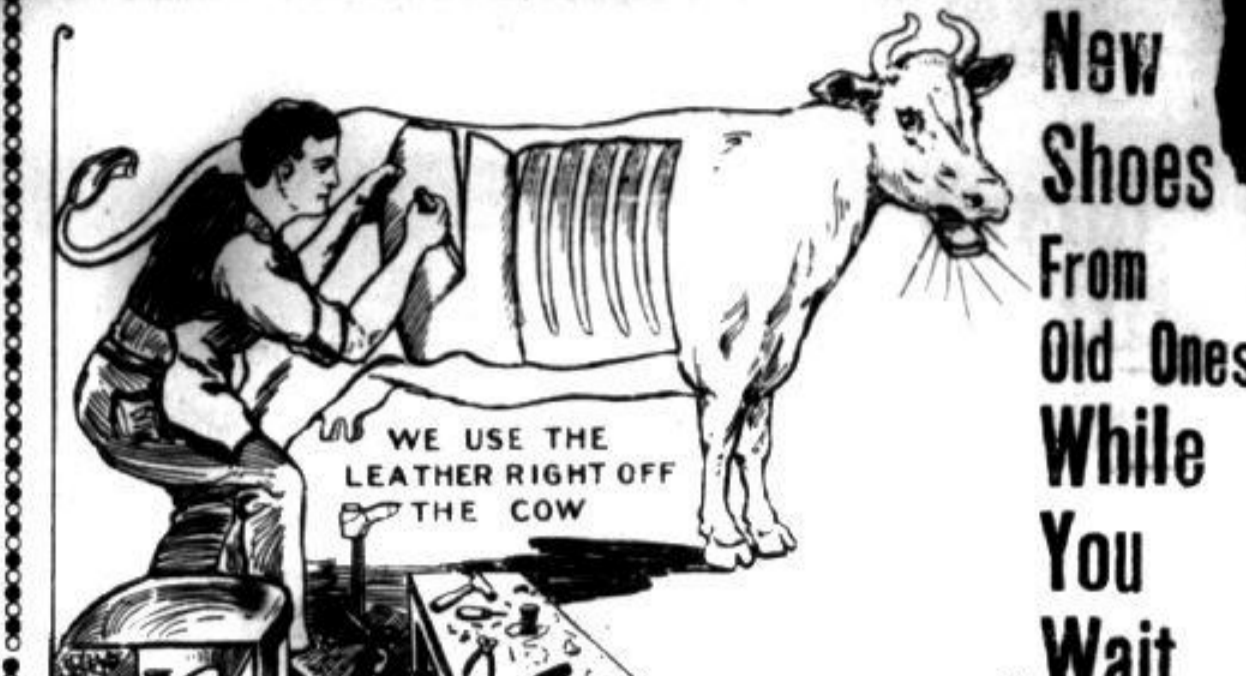

WORKED ON BUDGET

SELECTMEN LABOR UNTIL AFTER ONE A. M. ON BIG TASK.

Estimates of Appropriations Needed for Town Purposes During Coming Year Not Including Any Extraordinary Expenditures—Taxpayers Will Be Interested.

The board of selectmen held a special session at the Hall of Records last evening to make up the budget of appropriations for the coming year and it was a big job. There are many increases over what was asked for last year and if certain work is to be carried forward it will mean an increased tax rate for the property owners or bonding of the town.

The total estimated appropriations for the coming year are \$1,000,000. The board last night, footed up to \$10,000. From this an estimated item of \$1,000,000, which would leave \$9,000,000 to be raised by taxation. As the revenue work of other town department appropriations is not complete and will not be until next January, the amount of the grand list for this year is not known but a substantial increase is expected. At present it is a little over sixteen million dollars.

Some people expect the grand list to be boosted to approximately twenty five million dollars, with others figure it at as low as twenty two million. Taking the amount of money to be raised and figuring on a grand list of twenty-two million dollars, the board last night, footed up to \$10,000. From this an estimated item of \$1,000,000, which would leave \$9,000,000 to be raised by taxation.

APPROPRIATIONS. The charity department appropriation is figured at \$18,000, an increase of \$1,000. Cemeteries will require \$1,500 as against \$1,900 last year. Highways, same as last year, \$25,000. Sidewalks and curbs, same appropriation last year, \$10,000. North Main street improvement, \$1,000. Parks & selectmen.

Memorial Day. \$2,000. Sanitary, \$2,000. Miscellaneous, \$18,000. Notes are boosted \$40,000 to \$58,000. Oiling, a new item, will call for \$5,000. Schools, county and state tax items figure as not so accurate as they are at this time.

The selectmen figure that they will have items of income that will total \$1,000,000. These items will come from the balance on hand of \$9,900,000, money due \$12,300,750, dog and peddlers licenses at \$700 each, court orders, \$1,800, interest on deposit \$175, dock tax \$15,000, state and school taxes \$1,800, \$2,800 state school fund, ninth district, \$4,500, evening schools and state superintended, \$1,000. Items are estimated at \$400,000. Total \$1,000,000.
