HOLY NAME SOCIETY

LISTEN TO TALK BY HARRY M. BURKE ON TRANS-CONTINENTAL TRIP

Some Account of Places Visited and Observations Made in Travel To and From Pacific Coast - It ended Panama Pacific Exposition

The St. James Branch Holy Name Society opened the season by holding the regular meeting last Sunday evening in the St. James church chapel. There were about forty members in attendance. After transacting the usual routine business of the society Harry M. Burke was introduced as the speaker of the evening.

Mr. Burke recently attended the national convention of the Foresters of America in San Francisco, going as one of the Connecticut delegates and representing The Court Manchester Foresters of America of South Manchester.

Mr. Burke took his leave over the route the party traveled across the continent and gave some account of the observations he made in the several cities where the Foresters made stops. He was especially impressed with Denver, Colorado, as being a wonderfully progressive, alert and wide awake city. He pointed out what appears to be the lavish use of electric lights used there. He told of the miles and miles of streets that are as brilliantly illuminated as a White Way. This fact also impressed him with the city of Seattle, Washington, where the use of electric lighting is even more profuse than in Denver. Seattle also made a very favorable impression upon Mr. Burke. He found much to interest and entertain him at San Francisco and described it as being small in comparison with the Chicago and Buffalo Expositions, both of which he attended. Salt Lake City was one of the places of interest which he mentioned. The party made stops at Colorado Springs, Pueblo, and the Gods, and at Glacier Park. They also saw the habitations of the Cliff Dwellers, of which Shungopovi gave some account at first hands in one of his charming lectures at High School hall some few years ago. They also visited the Cave of the Winds. He noted the fact that all the railroads "killing the Rocky Mountains are now one and single track routes. He told of some of the immense tunnels through which the train passed and of the intense heat imposed upon travelers while making the subterranean passage. They had the pleasure of gazing upon the Royal Gorge, a place imbedded between high mountains so deeply that one may see the stars shining in the broad daylight, even as one can do in any deep well in Connecticut. The great desert with its prairie dogs was a sort of nightmare to him and he had no good words to offer for it. He found women bankers in the West and shops being operated all day Sundays. The New England observance of the Sabbath seemed to be an unknown quantity in the cities where the Foresters visited.

A visit to an ostrich farm near Los Angeles was one of the novelties presented to the Easterners, and an opportunity was given the Netueger to ride in a cart drawn by an ostrich and of having himself "rugged" while in that juvenile occupation. Mr. Burke carried his camera on the trip and took some pictures of various objects that were of special interest to him.

The lovely streets and parks of Los Angeles made a deep and favorable impression upon Mr. Burke. The great palms of the Pacific coast were like a sweet dream to his fancy. He saw some of the great big redwood trees of California, of which so much has been written and also told by travelers and lecturers. A trip to the Golden Gate was one of the treats of the trip.

The Tower of Jewels was one of the striking features of the Panama Pacific Exposition. The glass spire, so stilted in the sunshine and gave forth all their jeweled beauty, but the shades of evening brought out such a heavy fog that the powerful and plentiful lights that were on the spire were lost.

Fred H. Wall Gives Some Account of Political Doings at Nation's Capitol Where He Spent Two Years Studying Subject At Close Range

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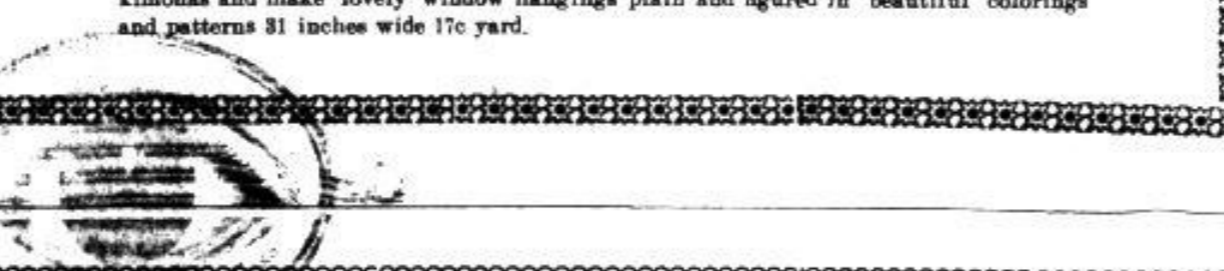

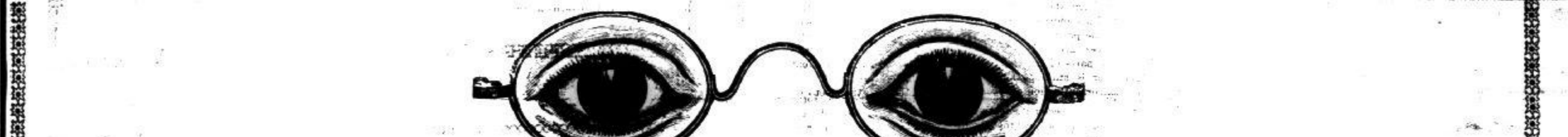
