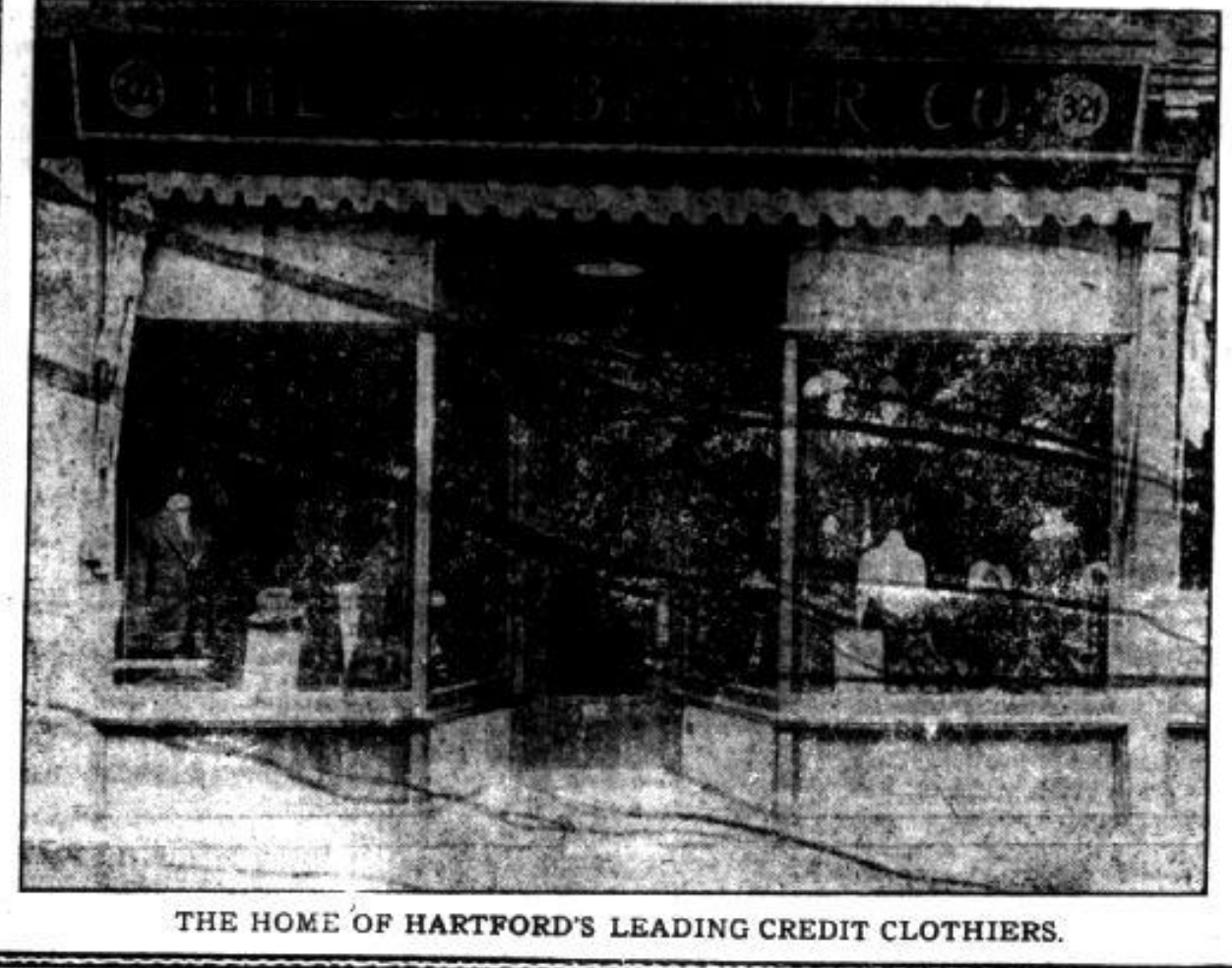

## SALVATION ARMY WINS

### Judge Tuttle of Superior Court Disallows Injunction

The temporary injunction which Sheridan Brothers secured against the Salvation Army of this place seeking to prevent the Salvationists from erecting a fence on the south side of their citadel next adjoining the Park Theater which Sheridan Brothers own, was dissolved by Judge Tuttle in the Superior court last Wednesday. The hearing on the question took place last Monday. Harry M. Burke and Herbert O. Bowers for Sheridan Brothers. Witnesses were heard by oral and written evidence, photographs of the premises were shown, and all the facts in the case from both sides were laid before Judge Tuttle.

Attorney Bowers endeavored to show by citations from court records that there was law on the side of Sheridan Brothers which would restrain the Salvation Army from erecting a fence on their own land. After looking up the citations the judge was unable to agree with Mr. Bowers and as a result rendered a decision in favor of the Salvation Army. This decision throws all the costs of the court proceedings upon Sheridan Brothers.

It will be recalled that the action arose out of the effort of Sheridan Brothers to effect an exit on the north side of their theater building in compliance with an order of the state police demanding better fire escape equipment. The decision is made of quartered oak lower part with upper section of figured frosted glass of attractive design. The entrance is open at the top to admit of ventilation. The electric lighting equipment of the entire suite has been changed over to the new and very desirable method of indirect lighting, high powered lamps being enclosed within a large suspended glass chandelier suspended from the ceiling with gilded chain attachments. A new quartered oak preprietary desk has been added to the equipment. A railing has been placed near the door which excludes persons from the interior of the office. Chairs are provided for the comfort and convenience of customers. The entire office is transformed into a modern and attractive place to do business. James Holloran of Center street put in the electric lighting. Mr. Holloran's carpenters did the wood work.

EARLY FIRE FIGHTERS.

There was an organized fire department in New York City as early as 1684, when a fire prevention squad existed, with duties resembling those of the modern fire prevention of today.

TRICOLOR OF FRANCE.

First Adopted in 1794, it Fell and Rose Again in 1830.

The French have always favored the colors of red, white and blue, and throughout their history red banners, white plumes and blue scarves have been largely used in connection with military and the army.

The French national flag, the tricolor, however, which combines the three colors of France, is comparatively modern. The flag was first adopted about 1794. A decree was issued which gave to all flags a kind of tricolor ribbon at the top of the staff and later the red, white and blue design was chosen for the national flag.
