



A PLUM PUDDING GIFT.

English Custom That Is Becoming wars liked to the discretificating were Popular In America. A Christmas gift that is growing as popular here as in England is that of a plum pudding. It may be made at home and goes to its destination daintily wrapped. though still in its mold. and tied with ribbons and holly. In England about 250 tons of plum puddings, averaging seven pounds each. are sent out each year. According to an old tradition, plum pudding should be at least "nine days old" before ts eating. To make, put into a big bowl one cupful each of finely chopped suct, seeded raisins, cleaned currents and granulated sugar, three cupfuls of soft breadcrumbs and one each of shredded citron and orange peel Add four eggs one by one, each being mix ed thoroughly with the other ingredients before the next one is added. Next to follow are half a cupful of milk. one-quarter cupful of brandy (if there) is no objection to its use, one tes spoonful of cinnaman, one teaspoonful of mixed nutmeg, clove and alispice and the grated yellow rind of one lemon. Mix thoroughly, using the hands then fill into a large buttered mold leaving scureely any room for it to swell. Tie a thickly greased and floured cloth or a piece of oiled paper over the top and fit on the cover as tight as possible. Put into a steamer or arrange some cords so that it may be suspended from the inside of the cover of the kettle in which it is boiled. MILK INSPECTOR'S REPORT FOR NOVEMBER 1915

Eighteen samples of milk have been collected by the Milk Inspecto and sent to the State Laboratory of Middletown, Conn., for analysis.

Following are the reports of milk analysis received: No. of Bacteria Fat Refrac- Per Cent.

Bacteria below 10,000 per c. c. indicates milk of very good quality.

Bacteria from 10,000 to 50,000 per c. c. indicates milk of good quality.

Bacteria from 50,000 to 100,000 per c. c. indicates milk of fair quality.

Bacteria from 100,000 to 500,000 per c. c. indicates milk of unsatisf

quality.

Bacteria from 500,000 to 1,000,000 per c. c. indicates milk of bad quality. Bacteria over 1,000,000 per c. c. indicates milk of very bad quality.

When milk contains over 500,000 per c. c. it indicates that conditions are
atisfactory and should be inspected. The milk is usually too warm or has been kept too long.
Refractometer reading under 36 indicates watered milk.

Refractometer reading under 36 indicates watered milk.

In reporting dirt by pencentage an arbitrary scale is used in which 100 per cent. clean indicates no dirt. Milk drawn and shipped under clean conditions should not grade below 90 per cent.

Test for preservatives made only when especially requested.

During hot weather in the larger cities it is very difficult to keep the number of bacteria below 100,000, but they should be kept below 200,000.

This General Grade is determined by combining the figures for bacteria, fat, refractometer and dirt, 100 being a perfect score in which the fat is 4.5 per cent, or above, the bacteria below 5,000, the refractometer 37.5,07 above and the cleanliness 100 per cent.
