## DR. WISE SPEAKS AT CHENEY HALL

## UNDER AUSPICES OF EQUAL FRANCHISE LEAGUE IN BE- HALF VOTES FOR WOMEN

**Met Numerous Objections Pre-  
sented Against Cause Urged  
With Masterly Eloquence  
Granting Great Privilege —  
Women Have Brilliant Advocate**

Some 300 persons assembled in Cheney Hall last Monday evening in response to the free invitation of the South Manchester Equal Franchise League who engaged Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York to give a discussion on "The Rights and Wrongs of Equal Suffrage". The stage and walls of the hall bore banners indicating the progress made in the equal suffrage cause by the United States and showing the number of states which women are now giving the complete franchise, together with the year in which said privilege was granted. A large banner at the rear of the stage bore the legend "Truth Will Set You Free."

Dr. Wise took up the stock objections that are urged against equal suffrage and shattered them with his 42-continent projectiles of logic and reasoning. He didn't leave a shred of them together. He took the different arguments up in order to expose their fallacy and weakness. Dr. Wise concluded his speech with a punning remark as full of brio as a comedian. When especially moved by the features of his discourse he gave expression to his feelings by pointing his left clenched fist upon the open right hand and stamping his foot upon the floor to further emphasize his emotions and give vent to his feelings concerning certain phases of the opposition to equal woman suffrage for women.

Dr. Wise immediately left the platform going down the main aisle and turning toward the stage asked the permission of the "Madam chairman" to speak from the floor rather than the platform which privilege was freely granted.

Dr. Wise stood in the middle aisle right among the people who were seated in the front rows and without loss of time began his discussion. The learned doctor spoke with some rapidity, distinctly, eloquently. It was his first appearance in South Manchester and those who were fortunate enough to be present were given one of the rare treats that can only be known by those who are privileged to witness the eloquent words of the eloquent

contention was that Christianity as yet has never been fully tried out. He said that there had been only one perfect Christian in all the world and that one was a Jew. Dr. Wise used this argument to show that reason, equal franchise had not brought about the condition of things because he had not ample opportunity to accomplish his mission no more than had the Christian religion in its two thousand years of existence.

In further discussing the alleged failure of Christianity to carry out its mission Dr. Wise suggested that the peoples of the world could try Judaism instead and if they did this they were sure to win. Referring back to the state of Wyoming he pointed out the fact that the entire

governments of the world among men will be no more wise.

At the conclusion of Dr. Wise's address a collection was taken up to aid the cause and persons were invited to send in questions which would be cheerfully answered.

Dr. Wise contended that the work of the Equal Suffrage League is more in the nature of religions or moral endeavor than anything else and that there might be some grounds for preventing a meeting in the high school hall based upon this phase of the work, but not an iota of foundation for the political contention.

Dr. Wise further stated that if he were a resident of this community he would struggle with all the power at his command to secure the use of the high school hall for the meetings of the National Fraternal League.

He urgently recommended a wider use of our school buildings in general and contended that the place for the meetings of the Equal Franchise League is in the school buildings.

The question was raised as to what advantage would the ballot be to women with regard to laboring conditions? Dr. Wise said that in the state of New York the canning season lasts from May until October and that the women there are compelled to work 12 hours a week, or twelve hours a day, and besides that in many cases do their own house-work. A bill had been presented in the New York legislature seeking to allow women the right to work in the garment short-handled mill in the canning industry. This bill passed the legislature but did not become a law because of the veto of Governor Sulivan. Had the women been voters in the Empire State at that time the shorter working hours for these women would surely have been enacted into law.

The question was asked whether meetings of the Equal Suffrage League should be permitted in the high school assembly hall. It will be recalled that the school committee proposed that the school assembly hall be used for the purpose of the hall for that purpose on the contention that the League represents a political party and that under the by-laws governing that hall, neither political nor religious gatherings may be held there.

Dr. Wise said that the Equal Suffrage League was in no sense a political organization and consequently should not be debarred from the use of the hall on that ground. He maintained that the women should not be denied the ballot for the reason that they do not bear arms in time of war, he made a strong point by declaring that women are not bear arms but arm themselves, they bear the men who bear the arms of the flushed abolitionists.

Erastus Cowles of Hilltown road was thrown from his sleigh last Monday afternoon while driving through East Hartford and turning a corner at New Haven Lane. As he turned the corner he struck a rock which was broken. Mr. Cowles managed to drive to his home and caused an X-ray examination to be made which revealed a broken bone. Surgical treatment was given,

and the doctor prognosticated that when women shall have universal equal suffrage and shall take their places in

Dr. Wise said that the Equal Suffrage League was in no sense a political organization and consequently should not be debarred from the use of the hall on that ground. He maintained that the women should not be denied the ballot for the reason that they do not bear arms in time of war, he made a strong point by declaring that women are not bear arms but arm themselves, they bear the men who bear the arms of the flushed abolitionists.

The objection has been urged that if the ballot is granted women they will be more likely to vote than men, and will cease to bring up families, nevertheless his contention was clear and distinct. His discourse developed into strong incentive at hand, which is the pioneer Equal Suffrage nation in the world, progressive more liberal according to population than any other civilized country or either hemisphere. He emphasized the fact that he addressed to civilized communities in this relation and not to Hottentots.

He is married, little just what the object of Dr. Wise's discourse was to many of those who sat in Cheney Hall last Monday evening.
