Obituary
MRS. CHARLES A. DAY.
The community was shocked to learn of the unexpected death of Mrs. Charles A. Day which took place at her home on Elm street at four o'clock last Monday morning after an illness of but three days with pneumonia. She had been suffering from an attack of the grippe some last week Tuesday, but kept about until Friday when it became necessary to combat an attack of pneumonia. The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon with services at the residence, Rev. Dr. George W. Reynolds officiated. Burial was at the East cemetery. Owing to the serious illness with pneumonia of Mr. Day and also of Miss Cornelia Rich, sister of Mrs. Day, who has been stopping at the Day home for several years past, the funeral was private. Mrs. Day was a native of Middle Haddam, was 49 years old for the past 12 years. She was well and favorably known and the profound sympathy of the large circle of friends goes out to Mr. Day in the sad bereavement which has befallen him. Mr. Day was devotedly attached to his wife and ministered to her needs in every conceivable manner throughout their long married career. Mrs. Day was at this writing Mr. Day seems to have survived the very trying ordeal with that courage that fittingly becomes a veteran of the Civil War, which is the proudest record which Mr. Day possesses. It is now believed that he passed safely through the crisis, and, barring unforeseen danger, stands a good chance for recovery. He is greatly cheered by the knowledge that he has many dear friends who sympathize deeply with him in his sorrow.

Henry W. Barrows of Bolton street died at his home yesterday morning after an illness of three months. The start was made with a severe grippe cold. This was followed by gangrene in the left foot. His physicians decided that his only chance for recovery was by amputation of the leg. With the characteristic courage becoming an old soldier Mr. Barrows consented to take the operation. He enlisted in the Tenth Connecticut Volunteers during the war and was with Grant in his fight for his life.

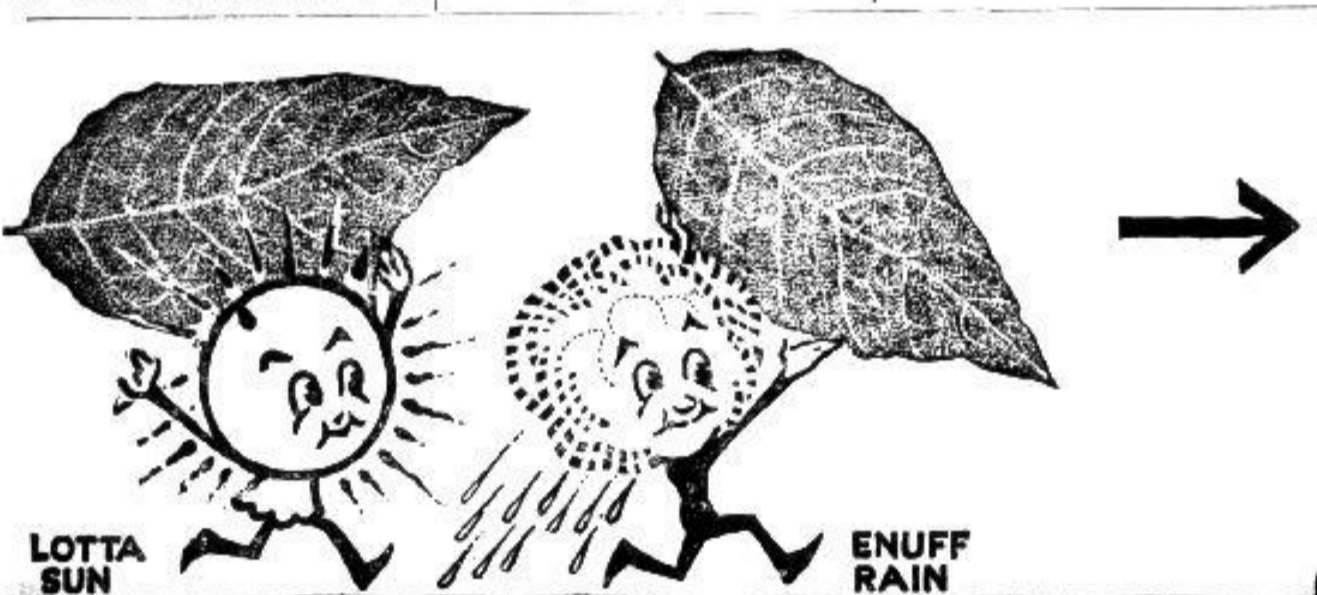

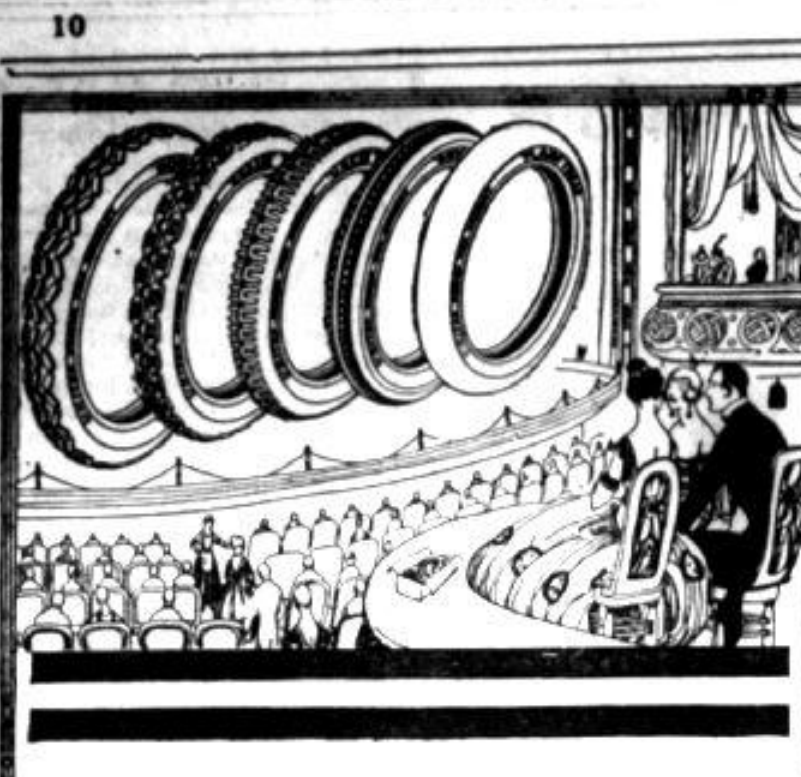

Mr. How will be at the Hall of Records every day except Wednesdays for the collection of persons desiring to pay the personal taxes. He will also be in his office at the Hall of Records Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon of each week. This warning should be ample and should be the means of bringing in the money due for the past season February 1, for the present tax season.
