SUPPLY AND DEMAND THEORY UNHORSED

CERTAIN PRESENTLY EXISTING CONDITIONS KNOCK OUT ITS ADMITTED SUPPORTING STRUCTURE

Gasoline Prices Practically Prohibited Demand Greater Than Now. Millions Of Gallons Placed In Storage Over Immediate Needs of Trade

It is a generally accepted statement that supply and demand control the price of commodities but the present case of the gasoline situation seems to knock the props from beneath this pet theory and leave it prostrate and defenseless.

It is a well known fact that millions of gallons of gasoline are being placed in storage by the manufacturers at the present time. In spite of this fact the selling prices of this much needed product are advancing to almost prohibitive heights.

The demand for gasoline was never greater than it now is. The price was never higher and the supply was never larger. Let advocates of the theory that supply and demand control prices, examine these extraordinary facts if they can.

In calling attention to the gasoline situation the Norwich Bulletin says: "It makes little difference what the commodity is, when the price commences to go skyward there is always a large number concerned there. Prices have advanced in all lines, but in none has there been much greater increase for the amount used and the amount available than in the case of gasoline. This has much more than doubled and at present there is no telling where it is going to stop."

Efforts have been made to get the benefit of a cheaper method of obtaining the product from the crude oil but it has had no effect upon the retail cost, however much may be expected of it in the future. But when the claim is made, and it has the appearance of being backed up by facts, that there are millions of gallons of gasoline being stored up while the price is steadily mounting it is difficult to understand why a heavier draft should be placed upon the consumer. If this was the only way in which the business could be conducted and secure a fair profit there could be no complaint, but such does not appear to be the case. The oil companies derive large profits under the old price. They paid big dividends and cut large amounts out of the business which they did, and without any increase in the cost of manufacture or the expense of handling the higher cost to the user is bound to result in so much greater rates. There is a difference between a reasonable profit and the gouging of the consumer because there happens to be a monopoly in this particular line. Prices may also be governed by the supply and the demand but with millions of gallons being stored up the supply appears to be above the requirements regardless of the fact that those who use the commodity are being forced to pay a handsome price for it. This leads to the conclusion that the monopoly is doing its best to drain the pocket-books of the consumer because it happens to be in position to do so.

CAIRNS OPPOSES TEXTILE TRAINING IN TRADE SCHOOL

PUBLIC CONFERENCE ENLIVENED BY FRANK ATTITUDE OF FORMER SELECTMAN

Howell Cheney Upholds Plan of Textile Training Which Has Been His Dream—Profitable Evening's Discussion of Community Interests.

The special conference called at the assembly hall of the high school last evening to discuss public affairs, did not attract a very large audience.

The meeting was enlivened when the discussion of the aims of the trade school were being touched upon by J. R. Trindar, state superintendent of trade school education.

In speaking of the textile branch as regards the textile school, Mr. Trindar touched upon a phase of the death of the school and said that Cairns had occasion to give voice to his ideas on the question.

They learned the trade or business in a manufacturing concern. Mr. Trindar did not believe the manufacturer should be called upon to educate children in trade lines.

Superintendent Trindar did not agree with Mr. Cairns on this question. He said it was the duty of the educators to provide the children with the education and also furnish them with the equipment to earn a living.
