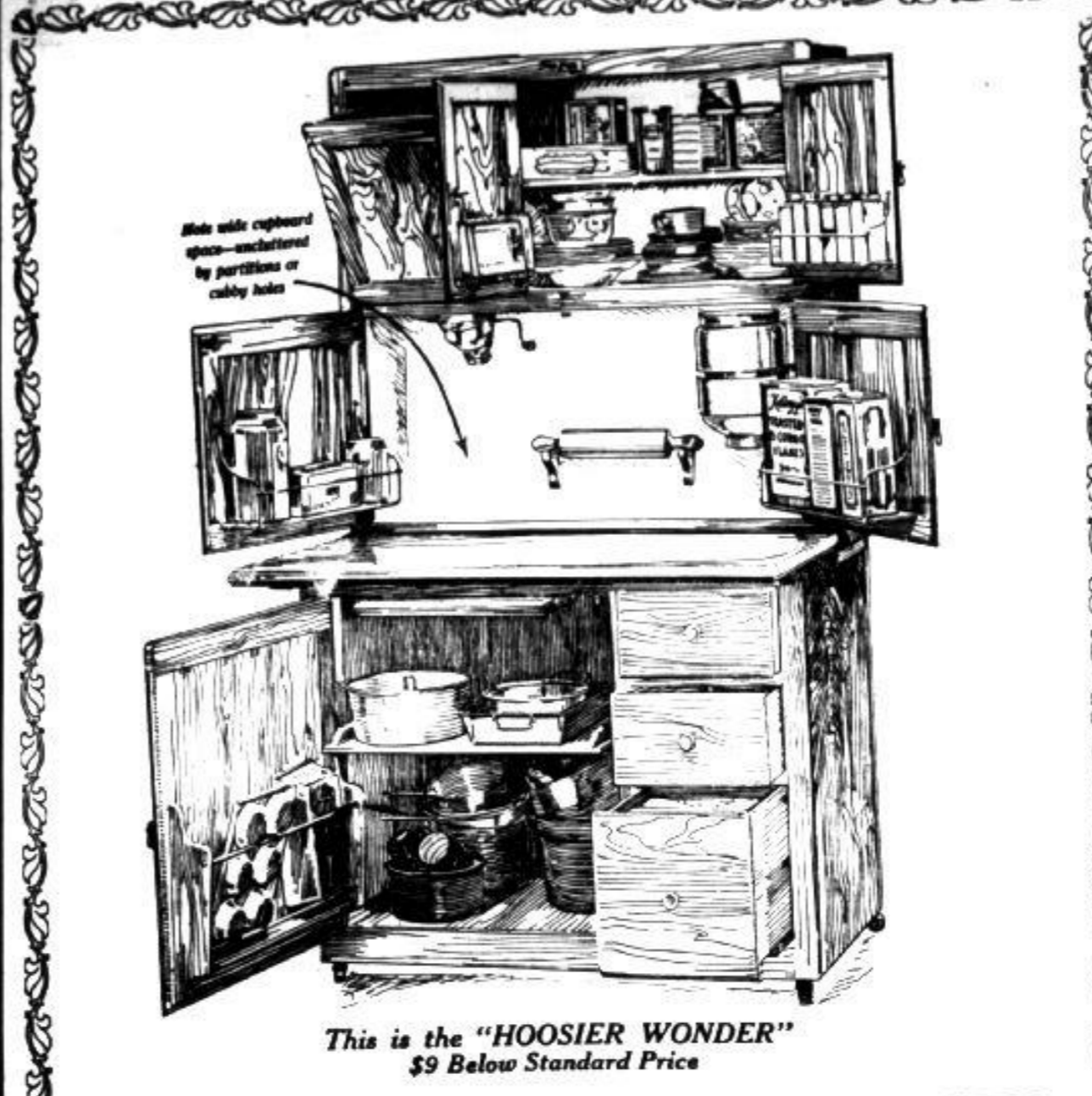

CAIRNS OPPOSES TEXTILE TRAINING IN TRADE SCHOOL

PUBLIC CONFERENCE EN LIVENED BY FRANK ATTITUDE OF FORMER SELECTMAN

The special conference called at the assembly hall of the high school last evening to discuss public affairs, did not attract a very large audience, but those who attended had an opportunity to get in close touch with what civic bodies are trying to do for the better being a source of work for the town.

Howell Cheney Upholds Plan of Textile Training Which Has Been His Dream—Profitable Evening's Discussion of Community Interests.

The meeting was called to order by J. R. Trindar, state superintendent of trade school education. Mr. Trindar had told of the interest in other places regarding the pictures which have been shown illustrating the several processes in the manufacture of silk.

HELD JOINT MEETING ENJOYED SHAD SUPPER

A joint meeting of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce and the Get-Together Club took place at Chesney hall Monday evening. A shad supper was served at 7 o'clock. The business meeting of the Chamber was held in the north lodge room. O. Elmore Watkins, R. O. Chosen, Jr. and Scott H. Simon were appointed a committee to act with the state chamber in an effort to relieve the freight congestion in Connecticut. President F. H. Anderson was authorized to appoint a committee to make arrangements for the annual summer outing of the chamber. The committee on public places was authorized to restore the broken sidewalk board which the Chamber of Commerce had constructed near the railroad tracks over north, as it has been broken down. E. T. Ferris remonstrated against the present practice of placing poles in the concrete sidewalks. The committee on complaints was authorized to prevent this practice in the future possible.

On motion of C. E. House the chamber filed a protest against the proposed change in the rural free delivery routes and the following committee was appointed to bring the protest of the chamber to the attention of the proper authorities: C. E. House, A. K. Bowers and L. St. O. Burr.

At the conclusion of the business meeting the members of the Chamber of Commerce again united with the Get-Together Club in the banquet hall and listened to a discussion of the dye situation by J. P. Cheney, chemist for Cheney Brothers.

W. C. Cheney was chairman of the committee appointed to report upon the question of preparedness. In the absence of Mr. Cheney A. K. Bowers presented the report. The referendum presented by the National Chamber of Commerce bearing upon the increased efficiency of the army and navy was agreed to by an overwhelming majority. The subject was discussed from many angles for two hours.

C. R. Hathaway chairman of the committee on the resolution regarding the railroad situation moved the adoption of the resolution on this subject sent out by the National Chamber of Commerce.
