SELECTMEN HOLD SPECIAL SESSION
MANY TOWN MATTERS OCCUPY BOARD'S ATTENTION.
Twenty-Five Foot Building Lines For Bigelow Street—Sidewalk Hearings—West Side Storm Sewer Hearing Scheduled For Wednesday Evening, June 14.

The board of selectmen held a special session at the hall of records last Wednesday evening during which several sidewalk hearings were held and the proposition of building a storm sewer along Bigelow street, west of Main street, was also given an airing. The board was in session until nearly midnight.

The hearing on the proposal for sidewalks on the north side of Lovell street was first considered and there being no objection a four-foot walk with granite curbing was ordered installed where improved walks do not exist at the present time.

No objection was raised to the proposal for a sidewalk on the north side of Charter Oak street. Harry R. Cheney requested that the walk be not less than five feet in width and Joseph O'Horman's idea was voted in favor of a six-foot walk with granite curbing installed on the north side of the street between Main and Spruce streets.

The board signed the contract for the construction of the concrete road on North Main street in which the cost is divided between the state, town and the Connecticut Company. The report of the building inspector or for permits issued up to May 20, a list of which appears elsewhere in The News today, was received.

H. O. Bowers representing Jeremiah Sullivan sent a communication to the board stating that Mr. Sullivan was willing to settle with the town for the sum of \$200 for injuries which he received when he fell on an icy sidewalk on Woodbridge street. The board voted to ask for a amended bill before making any terms. E. E. Hilliard sent a communication to the board stating that he did not wish to succeed his father, the late E. C. Hilliard, as a member of the Northwest cemetery committee. Dr. D. C. Y. Moore, chairman of the board of health asked that the selectmen appoint a deputy inspector to assist the board in making inspections about town.

A hearing on the establishment of building lines on both sides of Bigelow street was held and it was voted to order 25-foot building lines on both sides of the street.

A hearing on the assessment of two-thirds of the cost of sidewalk construction on Oakland street, the east side of Main street, will be held Monday evening, June 6th.

During Secretary Bowers' absence at the Republican national convention Selectman Rogers will act as secretary pro tem.

LIMIT TO POSTAL SAVINGS RAISED

DEPOSITORS MAY NOW HAVE AS MUCH AS \$1,000 ON THEIR BOOKS

Larger postal savings deposits will now be accepted at the postoffice, according to an official communication received by Postmaster Thomas J. Quish of the United States Postal Office and distributed to the public at a nominal charge.

The new law, which is to become effective on June 1st, allows a depositor to have an account amounting to \$1,000 upon which interest will be paid. Formerly the maximum amount he could have in his credit was \$500. The new law will be ready for distribution in July, but subscriptions should be forwarded immediately to the publication to place orders in advance. Better knowledge of postal conditions and requirements will be made through the Department of the Post Office, Washington, D. C., at present having advantage of the public time having advantage of the book.
