FITTINGLY OBSERVED

AT FORESTERS HALL LAST SUNDAY EVENING BY MEMBERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Senator Thomas J. Molloy of Hartford Delivered Oration Following Impressive Exercises By Court Manchester, Music and Song Enlivened Event
Last Sunday was observed as Memorial Day in the hearts of the Foresters of America. Inc. During the day delegations visited the several cemeteries and placed flowers upon the graves of the departed members of the court. In the evening the members and their families in goodly numbers assembled at Foresters hall and took part in the pretty ceremonial of revering the memory of those who had gone before.

Our departed brothers in life were co-workers with us in the noble quest of Forestry, and were participants in its sterling history, for tradition accords to Forestry an ancient and brilliant history in the cause of humanity.

In Forestry, we swear allegiance to God. We ever acknowledge our humble gratitude to our Creator, who expects us to do better than we are doing, and to our fellow men. We swear allegiance to our Republic, that highest recognition of the rights and dignity of man. 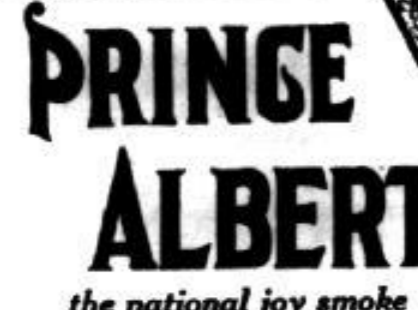

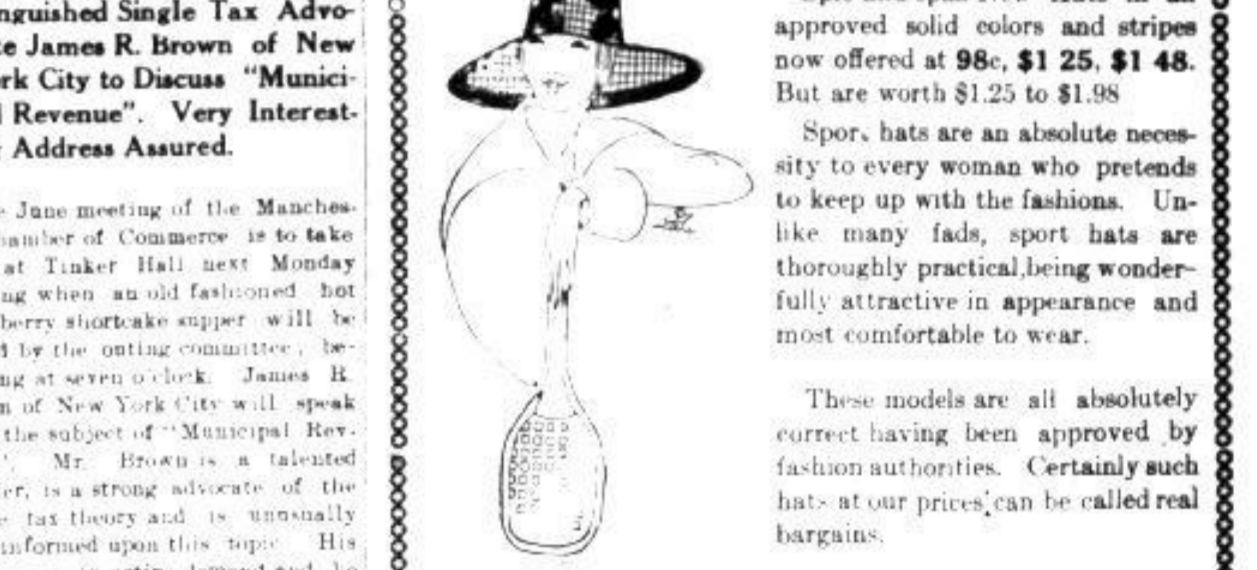
