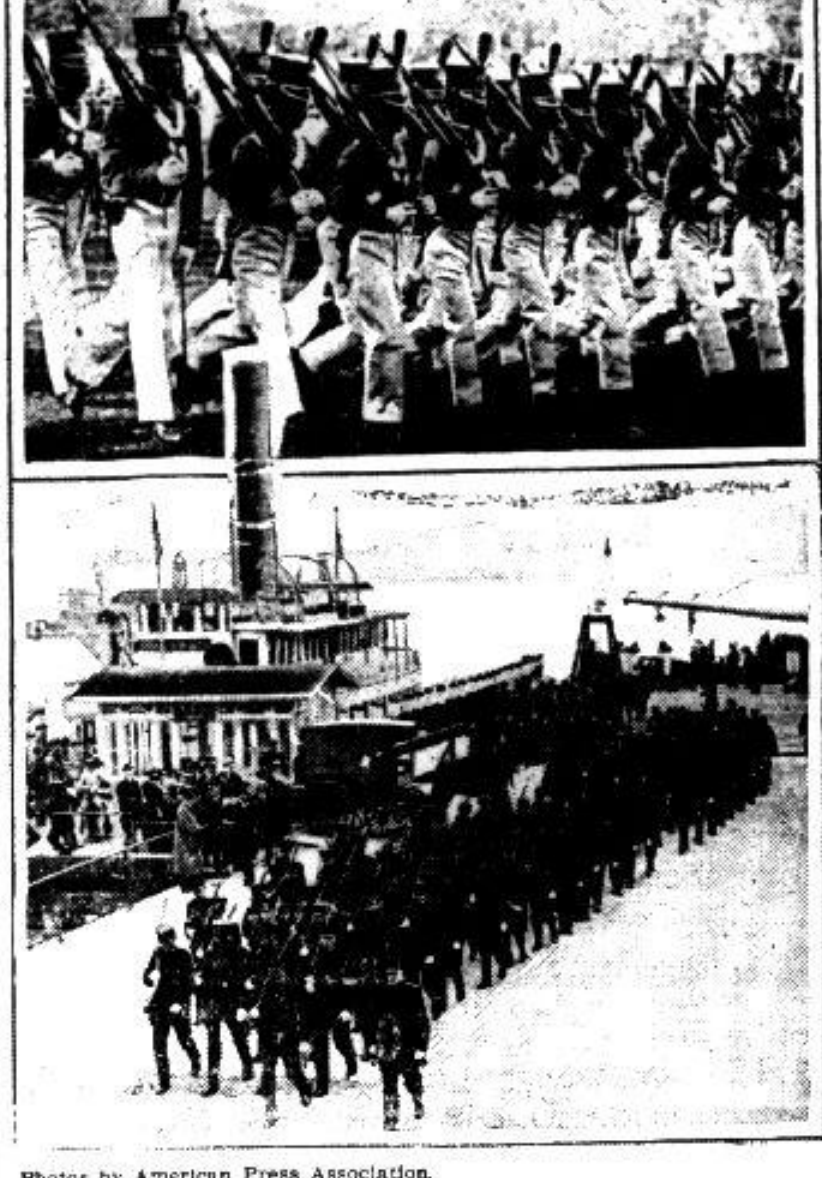

MUNICIPAL REVENUE ABLY DISCUSSED BY JAMES E. BROWN OF NEW YORK CITY DISTINGUISHED LECTURER

First Time Subject Was Brought Before Local Business Men. Very Illuminating Lecture Covering Main Points of Taxation. Much Interest Shown.

The closing meeting of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce took place in Odd Fellows hall Monday evening and attracted some 50 members. The chief attraction was the address on Municipal Revenue delivered by James E. Brown of New York City, the noted single tax exponent and social reformer. Mr. Brown made good on the advance notices which were published regarding his coming here and held the undivided interest of his audience for a continuous period of two hours. A hot strawbers shortcake supper was served, and routine business was transacted.

Henry Gottschalk and Thomas K. Clark were admitted to membership. Solutions upon the death of George W. Frisley and Carl E. Seaman were presented and approved. C. E. House reported progress upon the question of proposed changes in the local system of free rail delivery. Elmore Wagon reported upon the present transportation situation at the station over north. O. E. Top reported progress for the summer outing committee. The matter of registration of amusements enterprises was referred to a committee on the suggestion of G. H. Miller with a view to avoiding conflicting dates. The question of having city delivery for the north end was brought up by E. L. G. Hobson who urged the chamber to take action upon the project and push for its accomplishment. The question was referred to a committee. Details of this matter appear in another column.

Mr. Brown's address let to much light and gave the members something worth while to take home with them, think over and discuss at more length at their convenience.

A brief synopsis of Mr. Brown's very illuminating address follows: "The power to tax is the supreme power of the whole people. It is the power to create, it is the power to destroy. The right use of this power will make the desert blossom like a garden; the wrong use is to lay waste the garden like a desert."

"We can encourage industry, help development and stimulate progress, or we can do as we now do--punish thrift give a premium to idleness, stifle industry, destroy progress and lay waste the natural resources of our country."

"The single tax is the only tax that does not violate the right of private property. The only tax that takes public value for public use. The only tax that does not create on the one hand unjust burdens and on the other hand privileges."

they buy no furniture, no groceries, clothing, nor any labor product; they get some easy money, to gather words, to get something for nothing. "To tax labor values or products, is to drive away capital and to discourage industry, besides increasing cost of living."

"Manchester every year punishes industry by a fine of tax amounting to about \$180,000 and then to add to the sum of its follies it gives to landowners as a reward for idleness, in the form of land values, public property to the extent of about \$500,000. This enormous premium on idleness, results in the boosting of land values beyond the ability of labor and capital to pay the tribute."

"Manchester requires about \$200,000 this year for all purposes. Your land area is 17,586 acres, and allowing for streets, there are about 12,000 acres, 23,100. An average tax of \$1.25 per lot would yield \$683,500. And this without adding one cent to the cost of the land. This tax would give an improvement between your present lot and to pay \$12,000 or more--and your cheapest lot worth about \$4,000 or, if you were to abolish all taxes on improvements and persons, you would pay \$800.00 improved or unimproved, and the cheapest lot would pay \$200 as against \$12,000 now. Users of land would benefit, non-users would have to become workers and producers."

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WORTH REMEMBERING Obtained from the Speeches of the Late J. J. Hill "I've made my mark on the surface of the earth, and they can't wipe it out. 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HEALTH HINT FOR TODAY. Sleeping in Hot Weather. Nothing so effective as against hot weather as a good night's sleep, and for lots of other things in harder to get. If you haven't taken a reasonable amount of exercise perhaps you don't deserve much sleep. If you are troubled with indigestion, eat a light fruit supper or omit supper entirely. If your room or your bed is hot or if you are too warm to go to sleep quickly on a hot night take a cool bath just before retiring. A tub bath is excellent, but a cold rubdown with a cloth or sponge is almost as good. After thus becoming thoroughly cleaned and cooled by such a bath, it is comparatively easy to get a good night's sleep in spite of the hot weather.

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
