

Wilson on Labor

"I am a fierce partisan of the open shop."

"The class formed by the labor organizations and leaders is a formidable enemy to equality and betterment of opportunity."

Woodrow Wilson (1907) "Labor unions drag the highest man to the level of the lowest." Woodrow Wilson (1905)

"The usual standard of the laborer in our day is to give as little Woodrow Wilson (1909) as he may for his wages." These are the convictions of a Presidential candidate when he was not

in public life-when he was not running for office-when he was not looking for votes.

They are the expressions of a scholar, the teacher of political economy, the writer of text books and histories. Not the hasty, ill considered opinions of an under-graduate but the de-

liberate reasoning of a seasoned mind-of a university head. These are the views that Woodrow Wilson held when he was preparing thousands of young men for their administrative responsibilities, forming their judgment upon the relations between employer and employee, fulfilling his function of interpreter and advisor toward countless students who have since






