CANNING CULL APPLES
New Recipes for Utilizing Windfall and Unmarketable Apples
New recipes for utilizing windfall and cull apples for home use are being furnished to canning clubs by the Office of Extension Work, North and West, States Relations Service. There are many ways in which such apples may be made into valuable and palatable food products, such as apple sauce, cider, apple strap, apple vinegar, jelly, preserves, apple butter, etc. The new recipes, which follow, are for canning apples whole, sliced for fruit filling, and quartered for dried fruit. Only reasonably sound fruit should be used. Injured or decayed parts or overripe fruit should not be canning.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME THANKSGIVING MORNING
Plans are now under way for a town championship game of football between the Tigers and the North Ends which will be played on the Mt. Nobe grounds Thanksgiving morning. CANNING WHOLE APPLES
Wash apples. Remove core and stem. Place whole apples in blanching tray or cheesecloth and blanch in boiling water for two minutes. Remove and plunge quickly into cold water. Pack in large, empty glass jar or gallon can. You can use the product a hot thin strap of about 18 per cent density, or about 1 pound of sugar to 1-1/2 pints of water. Place rubber stopper slightly above the water and seal tip completely. From half-gallon or gallon cans, it takes 10 minutes to boil water bath (add 15 minutes in water seal); 10 minutes in steam pressure; 2 minutes in aluminum pressure-cooker outfit. Under 15 pounds of steam pressure. Remove jars, tighten covers, invert to cool, and test for leakage. The time of testing will have to be varied according to ripeness and condition of the fruit. Use just enough time to sterilize properly, and yet not enough to change the color and taste of the fruit. Firm and just apples may be cored and peeled first, then canned by the above recipe.

An Ideal Kitchen

The kitchen should be large enough to be comfortable as to temperature, ventilation and space. It should be arranged so that nearly all the work of cooking, dish washing, etc. may be done within an area of one hundred square feet.

The kitchen should not be so large as to make the work of keeping it clean a burden, nor so small that it cannot be well ventilated and kept fairly cool.

The woodwork in the kitchen should be very plain and finished. There should be no grooves to hold dust or moisture. The walls should be either painted or tiled, and the corners rounded.

The floor should be of hard wood, finished in oil, for this is very sanitary and easily cleaned.

The windows should be large and free to lower from the top as well as the bottom.

The sink should be one of good size, porcelain lined, with a sloping and grooved shelf at one end, on which to drain dishes after washing them. The sink should rest on iron legs and be under a left hand faucet. A straight awning over the waste pipe is a most essential necessity. A sink of proper height is of the utmost importance to the housewife. The faucet should be high enough so as to avoid any splashing. The sink should be placed at a convenient distance from the stove.

A medium sized table, movable to any part of the kitchen, which may be used when preparing food, is an important factor in the kitchen. A stool of such height as to afford comfort should also have its place in the modern kitchen.

Probably one of the most important pieces of furniture is the range. The size will depend on the size of the family. A simple stove with plain nickel trimmings shows better than a stove with elaborate trimmings. The stove to be placed in that part of the room where there will be no draughts. A gas stove may also be used in the kitchen and placed at a convenient distance from the range.

A cabinet, preferably one built in the line, is most useful to store utensils, linen, etc. in. The lower part may be used as a cupboard space. All parts of the kitchen should be finished in such a way that permits of washing. The walls should be of a light color, which adds to the cheerfulness of the room.

HUNTERS AUTO TURNS TURTLE

A passing automobile took Kerr and Best to St. Joseph's hospital in Willimantic. Best had several cuts about the head and Kerr, besides having cuts about his head, had a fractured collar bone. Smythe and Metcalf were brought to their homes in this place where they received treatment. Both men suffered from cuts and scratches and were severely shaken. The automobile was practically put out of commission by the accident and it is doubtful if it will be repaired.

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HEALTH HINT FOR TODAY.

Put the part instantly in cold water, or cover it with moistened baking powder and then with a wet cloth. When the skin is destroyed the point to be straitened is to exclude the air. Do this by covering the burn with sweet oil, cream, cotton or lint or with flour spread thickly on a linen cloth or on cotton batting. An excellent covering for burns of surfaces is made by mixing common whitening with sweet oil, olive, cod-liver or other oil, or even water, into a thick paste. With this the burn is carefully covered by means of a gauze or lint and is to be kept moist; then the whole part is covered with cotton cloth and kept clean and moist.

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TOWN OF MANCHESTER OR CITY OF MANCHESTER

QUESTION BROUGHT UP FOR DISCUSSION BY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

No Tangible Benefits Pointed Out by Proposed Change. Great Increase of Tax Burden Sure To Follow. Committee Appointed to Investigate.

At the meeting of the Manchester Chamber of Commerce held last Monday evening the proposal to change the corporate title of the "Town of Manchester" to that of the "City of Manchester" was brought up for discussion. There were a number of persons present who like the name "city" rather than "town" but do not want mayor, aldermen, councilmen and the other official titles that usually accompany, and are a necessary portion of a city form of government.

Whether the corporate title of the town could be changed by action of a special town meeting duly warned for this purpose, or whether the town would place at the disposal of the Legislature for necessary permission to take a referendum vote on the question were discussed at some length.

At the end of the debate little had been gained as to a tangible character to show real advantage to be gained by the proposed change of title other than the fact that this community would under the change of title be included in the directories, gazetteers, etc.

This appears to be a somewhat rather than practical and is not likely to appeal with much force to the taxpayers who would be called upon to pay the major portion of the necessary taxes and financial burden which the proposed change of form of government would undoubtedly impose.

The Town of Manchester is getting along quite well as it is that town, and has made an honorable and enviable position for itself among the many excellent corporate entities of the State of Connecticut.

Many of the local business men prefer to hold on to the present form of government which they know rather than rush into a city standard of measurement of greatness with which they are unfamiliar. They ask to be allowed what are the real benefits which the proposed change of nomenclature would evolve.
