NEW BILL PREPARED FOR STORM SEWERS

The board of selectmen held a special meeting last Tuesday evening when a number of the proposed bill to be presented to the legislature was read to the members. The bill was read at the meeting of the board last week but many changes were necessary before the board approved the draft of the bill.

Property owners will be interested in the passage of this important bill. It is designed to change the method of making assessments for benefits and damages caused by the construction of storm water sewers in town and will give the property owners a chance to approve the proposed assessments before the work is started, and not after the work is finished, as has been the case under the existing law regarding storm water sewer construction. The bill provides that the selectmen shall first get authority from a town meeting for power to construct a storm sewer. Following this step the engineering department will prepare an estimate of the benefits and damages to each property affected by the construction of the storm water sewer. A hearing will be held on the assessments as proposed and the right of appeal will be given. The assessments must be approved by a majority of the interested property owners before the work can be undertaken.

Another important clause in the bill is that it provides for the assessment of all property, both private and public. This will compel the assessment of all properties that are now exempt under the law such as church, school, fire department, town buildings and lands, cemeteries and such like.

When the bill comes from the legislature it will have to be passed upon by the voters of the town in town meeting assembled and approved by same before it can become a law.

Should this bill be accepted it would do away with all trouble caused property owners by the East Side storm water sewer now in use, and would also eliminate an uprising such as that successfully carried out last year by West Side property owners, when they removed their famous rebellion and overthrew the East Side selectmen who sought to force them to pay for the construction of a proposed storm water sewer on Center street, which they didn't want.
