LENENT ADDRESSES AT CENTER CHURCH

The Lenten address presented by the Church Night Committee at the Center Congregational church last evening upon the general topic "War, Progress of Civilization" was delivered by Judge Epiphrotas Peck of Bristol, who has been invited to give the address. The subject was "The Development of Law; Judge Peck considered his subject under the following outlines: Is international law really law? Is its regular expansion in time of peace and silence in time of war? The present controversy between the United States and the belligerent powers.

For next week Thursday evening Rev. Curtis Manning Geer, A. M. Ph. D., Professor of Medieval and Modern Church History, Hartford Theological Seminary, will be the speaker of the evening. The subject of his address will be "The Development of the Peace Movement of Europe and America with special emphasis upon the Hague Peace Conference and Their Results."

Professor Geer is a graduate of Williams College and the University of Leipzig. Besides his experience as a pastor, he has been Professor of Church History and Economics in Bates College, and since 1901 Professor of Church History in the Hartford Theological Seminary. He has made important contributions to historical literature and has been several years interested in the peace movement. He is at present secretary of the Connecticut branch of the American Peace Society and has made a study of the work and results of the Hague conferences. Admission is free to those who are interested. Persons are requested to come there prepared to ask questions, which will be cheerfully answered.

LOCAL MEMBERS OF C. OF C. INVITED BY ATTEND ADDRESS OF CONGRESSMAN

Popular Speakers Data on How Laws of Nation Are Passed Will Appeal to All Who Are Interested in National Affairs. Had Two Years Experience.

President George E. Keith, of the Manchester Chapter of Commerce, has received a communication from the committee in charge extending to all members of the Chamber of Commerce a cordial invitation to attend the citizens' meeting to be held in Forester hall Friday evening, March 16th, at 8 o'clock. That should be an unusually interesting and informing address will be given by Hon. Augustine Longergan, of Hartford, who represents the First Congressional district of Connecticut in the national congress at Washington.

The Chamber of Commerce has always shown commendable interest in national legislation, frequently through its committees taking votes on pending legislative matters and notifying the national law-making body of the Chamber of Commerce its attitude on proposed bills. In view of the interest of the Chamber of Commerce members in civic matters, national as well as local, it has been considered especially appropriate to include them in the invitation to be present when Congressman Longergan discusses the steps in the process of legislating for one hundred millions of people.

In addition to an interesting description of official life in Washington, the congressman will give his better informed data on what every citizen desires to know--the various steps in the journey of a measure from the time it is dropped in the basket and passes through the committee rooms of the House of Representatives to the moment, and solemn order of the dignified senate, and thence (if so fortunate as to survive so long) to its triumphant entry to the White House for the signature of the president.

Several inquiries have been made of the committee in charge as to whether persons will be welcome, particularly in view of the opportunity offered them through Congressman Longergan's address to learn valuable data about how the laws of the country are made. As already announced, the arrangements for the citizens' meeting are being made by the current events committee of the Democratic Club. Musical numbers will be given during the evening. The gathering is non-partisan, and no one is to be excluded by the crowded to capacity.

SCIENTIFIC HEREDITY CAREFULLY STUDIED OUT

BY MONK BEING FURTHER DEVELOPED IN MANY DIRECTIONS

Experiments Made With Common Pea Now Applied to Human Beings and All Lower Forms of Life Basis for Science of Eugenics Developed.

Gregor Mendel, peasant boy, monk and abbot of Brann, an experimental botanist whose work in his cloister garden laid the foundation of that exact knowledge of heredity which is now being extended in many directions, was born July 22, 1822.

He died in 1882. Eighteen years later began the appreciation of his labors. His doctrines, which are called Mendelism, form the scientific basis of the science of Eugenics. The science of being well born. Mendel's work made it possible for us to predict with precision whether good or bad traits will or will not appear in future offspring and to forecast with mathematical accuracy the proportion in which certain characteristics will appear and reappear.

This is important to the public health because defective persons breed defective persons and an increased knowledge of heredity means an increased power in the prevention of the creation of degenerate and insane persons on the one hand and normal, efficient people on the other.

The population of the United States increased about eleven per cent. between 1904 and 1910, while the number of persons in insane asylums during the same period increased 25 per cent. A single family of defective cost the State of New York in five generations over one million and a quarter dollars.

When it is realized that not only mental but also physical traits such as deaf-mutism, color blindness, gout, short-sightedness, alcoholism, epilepsy, imbecility and insanity may all be transmitted to offspring, the importance of Mendel's work to the public health and public pocket book is readily seen.

The prevention of the propagation of defective genes can be controlled by the education of parents so that they will endeavor to prevent a union of their children with children of defective families; legislation requiring a medical certificate of parties applying for marriage licenses and surgery which aims to render defective incapable of procreating. Indiana, Wisconsin and California have laws permitting such operations.

The segregation of defectives has not proven practicable; in fact it serves to increase rather than to decrease their number.

Mendel's experiments were made with the common pea, but the principles which he deduced from his studies are applicable not only to mankind but to all of lower animals, and are hence of importance to the public health worker, the biologist and the agriculturist.—United State Public Health Service.

RECRUITING OFFICE OPEN FOR HOME GUARD

IN OFFICE OF R. G. RICH, TINKER BLOCK, MAIN ST. SOUTH MANCHESTER.

Men Between Ages 17-60 Years Asked To Enroll For Constabulary Duty Within State. Men Will Be Uniformed, Armed and Drilled.

By authority of an Act entitled "An Act for Recruiting the Home Guard," enacted by the General Assembly of the State March 9, 1917 and approved by the Governor on the same day the governor has appointed the undersigned as Military Emergency Board of this State to take action to perfect and maintain a body of armed troops for constabulary duty within this state to be known as the Home Guard. The following officers have been appointed for the Town of Manchester in order to carry the Act into effect:

W. C. Cheney, J. D. Cheney, R. G. Rich, P. Cheney and Philip Cheney. This recruiting board has opened an enrollment station at the office of R. G. Rich, Tinker block, Main street, South Manchester, which is kept open at convenient hours.

RECruITING INSTRUCTIONS

Instructions for recruiting officers of the Home Guard, issued by the Military Emergency Board, defining who may and who may not be enrolled in the Home Guard.

Applicants for enlistment will be examined by surgeons appointed for that purpose.

Unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 45, who are physically fit and liable for service in the National Guard or the Naval Militia of the State of Connecticut, will not be enlisted in the Home Guard.

Unmarried men between the ages of 18 and 45, who are physically fit for service in the National Guard or the United States army or navy, should make application at the recruiting stations of such organization.

All men between the ages of 18 and 45, residents in towns or adjacent to those towns in which a unit of the National Guard is maintained, are liable for service in the National Guard and should not seek enlistment in the Home Guard until the National Guard units in which the man is a member are organized to the strength required by law.

All men between the ages of 17 and 60, resident in towns in which a unit of the National Guard is not maintained, or which is not adjacent to a town in which a unit of the National Guard is maintained, can enlist in the Home Guard.

Any person enlisting in the Home Guard, desiring to enlist in either the National Guard or Naval Militia of the State of Connecticut or the army or navy of the United States, will be discharged from the Home Guard.

Men enlisting in the Home Guard who may become liable for service in the National Guard or the United States army or navy at any future time, will be discharged from the Home Guard.

Men between the ages of 17 and 60, who have received an honorable discharge from the National Guard, the Naval Militia, or the army or navy of the United States, can be enlisted in the Home Guard irrespective of residence.

Recruits will be notified when to appear before examining surgeons and when to report for equipment and instructions.

In an emergency a body for local defense, the Home Guard will provide training and discipline and, in case of need, can furnish the enlisted strength to fight with and between the ages of 18 and 45 and fit for duty in the National Guard.

TO WORK HOME GRADENS

The members of the committee recently appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to consider the matter of home gardening are actively taking hold of the duties assigned them and are energetically preparing to show the results of their work within a very short time. They have organized by choosing Horace L. Gardner as chairman and St. Clair Burr as secretary. They have already held several meetings and are studying out the best methods of conducting the new project which has been placed at their disposal. They are preparing application blanks which will be issued at once and may be secured from the several members of the committee.

Besides the two named above the following are members of the committee: F. A. Verplank, George A. Johnson, Robert J. Smith, William G. Cheney, R. LaMotte Russell, E. H. Hugh Crosby, G. H. Miller, Dr. C. R. Heselgrave and H. S. Busby all of South Manchester. W. H. Card of Manchester and W. C. Pitkin of Manchester are also active and energetic men.

Cheney Brothers have generally offered the use of the large tract of land lying on Hartford road directly opposite the Seaman house, and known as the Turkington place. Also the land in the valley on the south side of Hartford road in the vicinity of Keel Mill.

There are altogether at the present time 50 acres of land available for the purposes of the home gardeners. These will be divided into plots containing approximately one-eighth of an acre each and to distribute the cost of this work among the home gardeners. It is estimated that the plowing and harrowing of one-eighth of an acre would cost about \$1.00. The home gardener will then plant the seed and do the work of planting and cultivating his appropriation of land. The new recruits are Where small parcels of land are less for this use it may be that some of the home gardeners may prefer to spare their land instead of having it plowed.

The officers and members of the committee will encourage the home gardeners to plant such crops as may be of great benefit to the community. These furnish supplies at a time when such products are usually expensive. These would include potatoes, corn, beans, tomatoes, turnips, carrots, and other such crops. It is estimated that these small fruits and other transient table products.

This home gardening movement is taking on a nation-wide character and is likely to be used in most manufacturing communities and in the suburbs of cities.

It is believed that when the plan is once put into operation it will be continued year after year and the list of home gardeners in communities like this will grow apace. This will surely be a good thing and will bring the waste places into a high state of cultivation, will furnish supplies for the home and family and by enabling the patter families to secure their supply of vegetables at low prices will accordingly reduce the cost of living.

Apart from that it will give the men with surplus energy an opportunity to do some outdoor work which will be highly beneficial to them from a physical standpoint. With the milk milk closing at six o'clock there are nearly four hours for outdoor work each day at the disposal of the home gardener. This employment will not take on the characteristics of a job but will be a pleasure. It will strengthen the body, bring ease and comfort to the mind, remove anxiety and introduce peace, plenty and prosperity in the home, all of which are worth the sacrifice of money.

In conclusion we would say that persons wishing to take advantage of this home gardening movement should do well to get in touch with any of the persons named above, who will furnish them with application blanks and will make provision for allowing them space in the home gardening and are energetically preparing to show the results of their work within a very short time.

HOME GUARD BEING FORMED

In response to the call of Governor Marcus H. Hoomb's Home Guard is being formed in South Manchester and already 70 men are enrolled for that service. The 23 members of Ward Cheney Camp United Spanish War Veterans joined in a body yesterday. These are all men having had military experience as they were in the service of the United States in 1908 at the time of the Spanish American War. The number of members of Company G are also among present members of the Home Guard.

These men are to be uniformed, armed and drilled. Officers are to be sent here to bring the veterans back to the active practice of the drill and the new recruits will receive their kindergarten instructions in the gentle art of military duties.

A recruiting office is established at the office of R. G. Rich in South Manchester and here is where the great bulk of the enrollment work of Home Guard is being carried on.

It is proposed to divide the Home Guard into units of 20 men each, to assign necessary officers to each unit, and to thus keep the bodies from becoming too unwieldy. There are men being enrolled now to form a substantial nucleus for Unit No. 2, and recruiting is going steadily on.

It is not believed that the local Home Guards are to be called out for duty anywhere other than in this town, and surely not outside of the state. In case of serious disturbances, which in some city or town which perchance might get beyond the control of the local authorities or local Home Guards, the members of the Home Guard are to be called out to assist in such an emergency be sent out to render such aid to their fellow members of the Home Guard as might seem desirable, but such condition not arising within the confines of their own ballistics.

COMPANY G CALLED OUT BY GOVERNOR HOLCOMB

Last Sunday evening at eight o'clock the fire alarm siren sounded the twelve blasts which call out Company G First Infantry C. N. G., and the boys hastened to the armory to learn the cause of the alarm. They were notified that the governor ordered them to assemble at the armory the following morning at seven o'clock and await instructions from their superior officers. This they did and all week long have been under orders and awaiting the call to leave town. Guard musters is maintained for 24 hours each day at the armory, recruiting is going on, and drills are being executed in the open day by day.

When the call arrived and recruits are constantly rallying to the colors. It is expected that the company may be recruited up to war strength before leaving, namely 150 men, including the officers. There is a great deal of enthusiasm among the members of Company G, and young men are answering Governor Holcomb's call for enlistment with commendable spirit and patriotism.

While no definite knowledge is at hand about the situation it is currently believed that the company will not be ordered away from South Manchester before perhaps the middle of next week, or perhaps later. The Congress of the United States is summoned by President Woodrow Wilson to assemble at Washington, D. C. in extraordinary session next Monday to organize and then to hear an address from the President regarding the relations of the United States and Germany. Many believe that Congress will declare war against Germany, and many others are of the opinion that a declaration will be made that a state of war exists because of the destruction of American lives upon the high seas by the Germans and also because of the sinking of American merchant ships by German submarines. The President is to place the entire situation clearly and fully before Congress and then it will be up to that body to take such measures as they may see best and most fitting to meet the emergency now existing between Germany and the United States.
