BUCKWHEAT CROP FOR LAND STILL UNPLANTED

The farmers having land which is not yet plowed have an opportunity to grow a fair amount of grain on land where early sown crops have failed, or it has been impossible for some reason to put in a crop as yet. Land not fertile enough for corn will grow buckwheat nicely—yields ranging from 15 to 25 bushels per acre may be expected. On run out land 60 pounds of (2-10-0) fertilizer per acre should be applied—on good land a fair crop may be expected without fertilizer. It does not fit into dairy farm operations well because seedling conflicts with early haying and cultivating, while harvesting conflicts with silo filling. Many farmers, especially poultry men, are finding time to put in a few acres, however. Every farmer with tillable land not yet planted may well see it to buckwheat.—Conn. Agricultural College Bulletin.

SPARKS BIG CIRCUS HERE LAST TUESDAY

Sparks Circus paid its first visit to this town last Tuesday and was one of the best exhibitions of its kind ever seen in this place. The parade was a large one, contained ample variety, furnished plenty of music, with two brass bands, and two callioles, and had a large number of well groomed horses. The weather was delightful for the parade and shows, afternoon and evening performances being given. The circus covered practically all of the Hollister lot on Main street, where the exhibition took place. It was what was known as a three-ring circus and an entertainment of ample variety was given, including bare back riding, displays of skillful horsemanship, aerial activities by acrobats of much skill, and daring Japanese foot juggling and tumbling performances on the tight wire and the slack wire, a group of a half dozen clowns, performing elephants, performing seals and performing lions, daring wild west men and women riders, etc. They had plenty of side shows where freaks of all kinds were exhibited.
