RED, WHITE, BLUE BOOK

The Red, White, and Blue Book, "How the War Came to America," has been issued by the Committee on Public Information at Washington.

Its contents are 33 pages of introductory historical matter, with the address of President Wilson to the Senate on January 22, 1917, and his address to the joint session of the House of Congress on April 3 announcing the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany and asking that a state of war between the United States and Germany be recognized.

The traditional policy of the United States always strictly adhered to its abstaining from any entangling alliances and participation in European controversies is set out ably, with citations of incidents and documents in proof.

The position of the United States in the summer of 1914 is summarized as follows:

"1. The Monroe doctrine.—We had pledged ourselves to defend the New World from European aggression, and we had by word and deed made it clear that we would not interfere in any European dispute.

"2. The Freedom of the Seas.—In every naval conference our influence had been given in support of the principle that sea law be just and that no nation should be based on the consent of the governed.

"3. Arbitration.—As we had so long insisted upon arbitration as a Federal tribunal, we argued a similar settlement of international controversies. Our ideal was a permanent world court.

We had already signed arbitration treaties not only with great powers which might conceivably attack us, but even more freely with weaker neighbors in order to show our good faith in recognizing the equality of all nations both great and small."
