



GETS \$100 RAISE lectmen Divided On Salary Boost-Make Compromise

SUPERINTENDENT RISLEY

A considerable portion of the time f the board of selectmen last Monday evening was taken over by a discussion as to whether the salary of Charity Superintendent John S. Risley should be boosted \$200 per year or not. The matter was brought to the attention of the board last May when Mr. Risley let it be known that he would be agreeable to an increase in salary. stating that the cost of living was one of his reasons and another was that he had to give more attention to his farm, as he was unable to hire the necessary outside help, Mr. Risley receives \$800 for salary and \$200 for delivering groceries to dependent families, making his compensation

\$1,000 per year.

The matter has been before the board at several meetings and was refered to the charity committee. Investigations were made with what other towns and cities about the size of this town were doing in the way of compensation to their charity officials and the selectmen were pretty well settled in their minds that Mr. Risley was well taken care of. The matter was kert in the hands of the charity committee and at a special meeting before Monday evening's board meeting that charity committee disagreed on the question of an increase. Two of the members were opposed to an increase and one member believed the increase was warran-

At the meeting of the board Mr Risley was present and gave a long list of figures tending to show that by his efficient methods he had saved money for the town and was entitled to favorable consideration. Mr. Risley was questioned freely regarding the time he spent on charity work, but did not answer so freely. Some of the selectmen sought to ascertain how much time it required on Saturdays to deliver groceries to less than a dozen persons and Mr. Risley said he could not tell them. He said that in delivering supplies he very often conducted investigations at the same time. So uany questions were asked Mr. Risley that his arguments for an increase were frequently broken up to explain different phases of his work. Finally he said that he believed he had proven his case and he asked that the selectmen give him the same consideration that had been given other employees of the town as regards wages. He said he thought he was entitled






