OFFICIAL LIST APPEARS IN ADVERTISING COLUMNS OF THE NEWS TODAY

Nine Republican Candidates For Selection. But Seven May Be Elected. Spirited Contest Ahead. Extra Man Looking For Position As Constable.

The direct primary is to take place at the town hall Tuesday, September 11, 1917 for the purpose of nominating candidates for town offices. The polls will be open from six o'clock in the forenoon until eight o'clock in the afternoon on that day for the purpose indicated above.

There are nine Republicans who aspire to the office of selectman this year, and seven Democrats. This fact insures a spirited contest for the honors, as honors and political power and influence are the prime objects of the aspiring candidates.

As matters stand here at the present time there is not a single chance for the election of a Democratic selectman. The Republican majority is entirely too ponderous to be overturned, be the qualifications for office of any Democrat what they may.

For the office of constable there is also a contest this year. Under the present constitution the political party is entitled to four of the seven constables chosen, and the second party in point of prominence may be elected as constable. On the Republican list this year there are five candidates for the nomination and but four of these may be chosen.

The new candidate on the Republican list is Nicola Marcontino, who has been endeavoring for some time to break into the superannuated police list. Mr. Marcontino is desirous of wearing the uniform of blue with gilded buttons, and has the privilege of wielding a truncheon while in the discharge of the duties of constable.
