MODERN MANAGEMENT OF LOCAL CEMETERIES
DEVELOPS INTERESTING SITUATION AND SHOWS 'T' WAS TIME CHANGE WERE MADE

New Method Accounting and Charging Shows Strong Balance Favor of Town. After Nearly Six Months Entire Appropriation More Than Intact.

The financial statement showing the condition of the several town departments was read and ordered filed at the meeting of the board of selectmen last Tuesday evening. One of the interesting facts brought out in the batch of figures was that in the cemetery account at the annual town meeting an appropriation of \$1,600 was made for cemeteries. Since that time there has been expended \$200. Credits have been received which brings the balance available April 15, up to \$1,758, which is \$158 more than was appropriated last fall. This showing is brought about by a new system of keeping the accounts of the cemeteries and the charges made. From present indications it may not be long before the cemeteries will be self supporting. Mr. Gotberg was a clerk at Cheney's store at that time. Representative C. E. Howe was selling tickets for rooms at the Hotel, Endeavor, near the World's Fair grounds, Chicago. Charles Swanson and Miss Mary Benson were married by Rev. A. H. Olson. They took up housekeeping on Main street near the Park building. Mrs. J. Jones of Madison, N. J. succeeded Jerry Maher as coachman for H. O. & B. Cheney. Mr. Maher was given a handsome present on leaving town. William Joyce's little boy was bitten on the face by a mastiff owned by the Misses Scollon of Pine street. The dog was promptly put to death. As the firm is to construct and pay the entire cost of the work all that the town will be asked to do will be to furnish the grade and curb lines. It is Cheney Brothers plan to place granite curbing on the streets and construct four-foot concrete sidewalks on the sidewalks which have been laid. The two-foot granite plots can be filled with concrete sidewalks giving six-foot walks. The request of the company was cheerfully granted.

ARMENIANS AN ANCIENT RACE They Lived in Many Places Before Occupying Regions Which They Have Held for Many Centuries.

### HOW TO GROW Snap Beans

For the best results, the soil should be free from all nitrogenous matter, or the plants will run to foliage and stems at the expense of the crop. Beans will withstand frost, and the first plantings in the spring should not be made until the soil has warmed to a rich loam. The seeds should be in good condition and the rows should be laid out perfectly. Beans should be sown in rows 24 inches apart. ### HOW TO GROW Asparagus

Nothing is better than milk on which to raise thrifty, growing calves, whether they are intended for the dairy, the feed lot or the slaughter. The ordinary farmer often finds milk too expensive as a calf food. The following substitute is recommended by the Massachusetts Experiment Station: Twenty-two pounds ground oats, ten pounds linseed meal, five pounds middlings, 11 pounds fine corn meal, 14 pounds fine blood meal, one-half pound salt. Total cost, three cents per bushel.

### MILK SUBSTITUTE FOR CALF

Early peas require a rather rich sandy loam with good drainage in the fall as they are in the spring when getting an abundance of green forage, and having access to a wide range of feeds. It is necessary, therefore, to give them more attention and better care to offset seasonal conditions and danger from new crops. Do not feed in the same lot, or on the same acre of ground, day after day. Do not feed in the same lot, or on the same acre of ground, day after day. This contaminates the feeding places, and also attracts flies, pigs, cows, and sparrows which may have feeding with a cholera infected feed. The feed should be changed every spot each day, thus giving the plants a clean "plate" from which to eat.

### HOW TO GROW Snap Beans

Beans and pole beans are among the most valuable and dependable crops of the garden. When in doubt what to plant, beans are a safe bet. Beans thrive best in a rather warm sandy loam, but may be grown on almost any kind of soil. For the best results, the soil should be free from all nitrogenous matter, or the plants will run to foliage and stems at the expense of the crop. Beans will withstand frost, and the first plantings in the spring should not be made until the soil has warmed to a rich loam. The seeds should be in good condition and the rows should be laid out perfectly. Beans should be sown in rows 24 inches apart. 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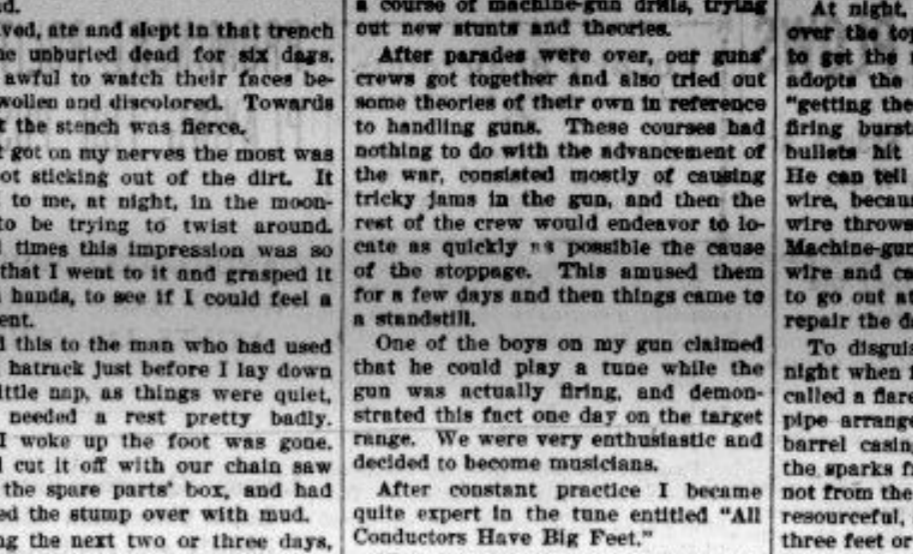
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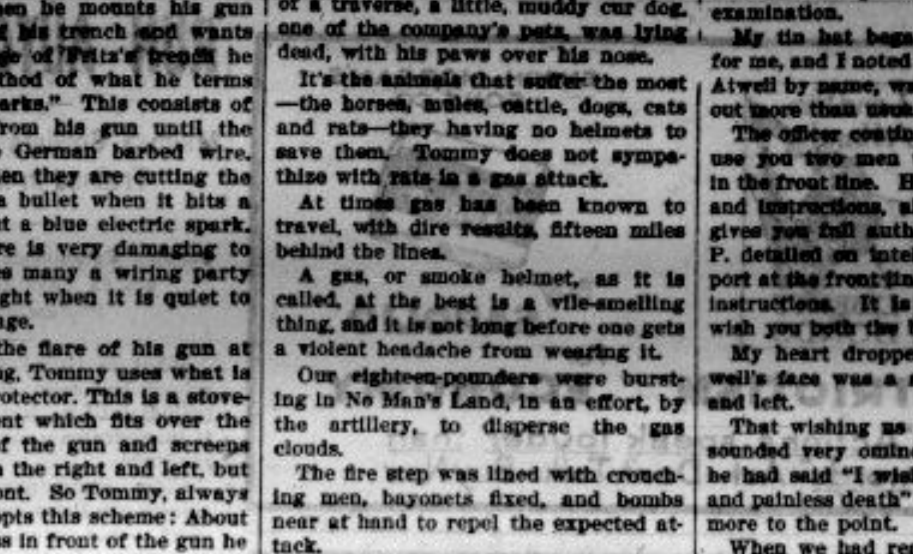
