WATCH YOUR TROLLEY MAIN ST. NO MORE

Persons going by trolley from South Manchester to Hartford must bear in mind that South Manchester cars do not go beyond Market and State streets. They traverse the boulevard after leaving it at bridge in Hartford, and go up State street to Market. From thence they swing through Market to Morgan on their return trip. It will be observed that at this arrangement the South Manchester trolleys do not go to Main street at all. Neither do they reach

up to Central Row where they have been discharging and receiving passengers for several years past. Persons should not wait at any of the Main street stores for a South Manchester trolley to come along when they want to come home. In stormy weather this arrangement will be found quite an inconvenience to many. Persons during storms were wont to wait in the shelter of the Main street stores for the coming of the trolley. This can be done no more under the present arrangement.

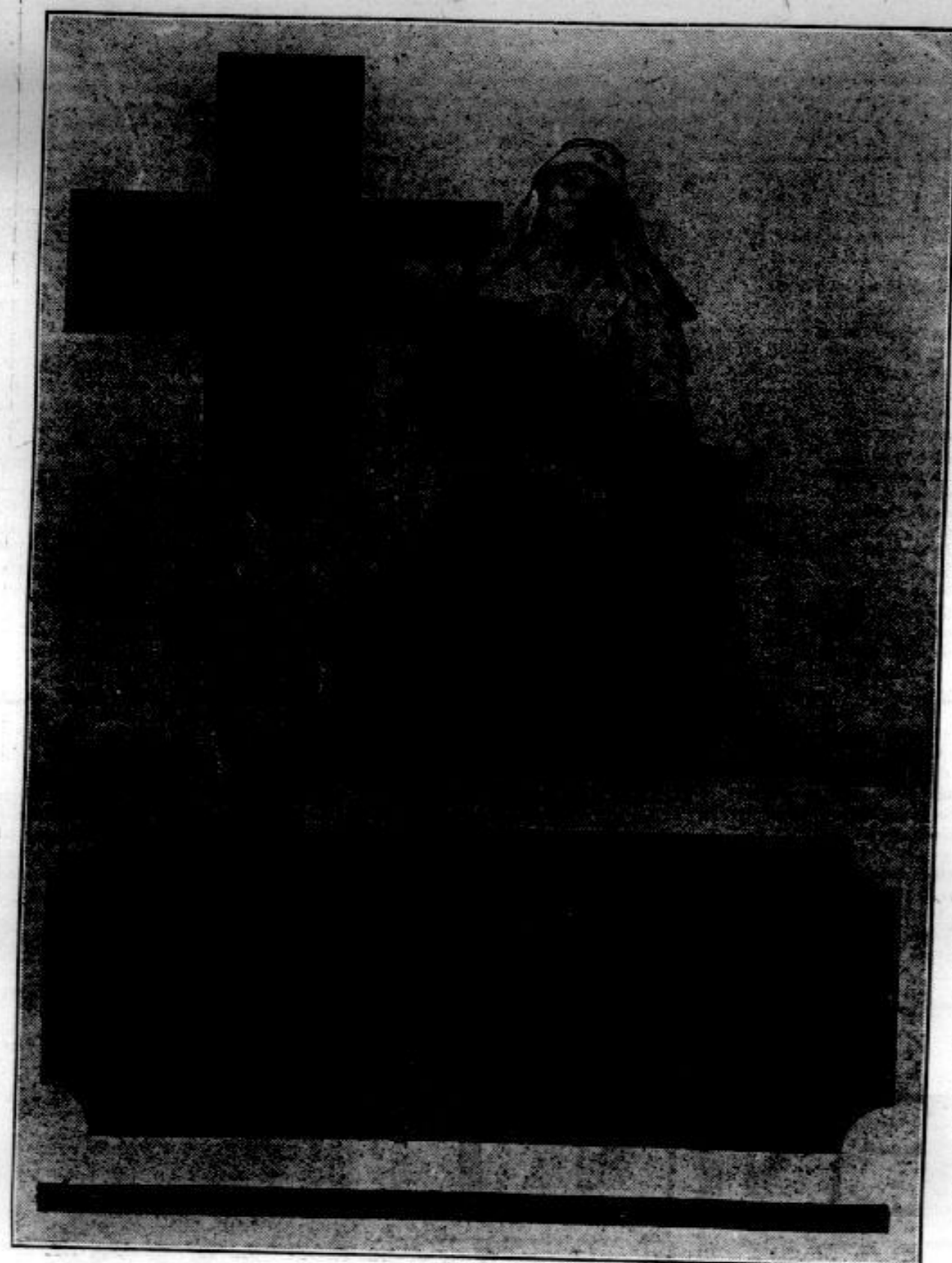

OPEN AIR RALLY AT WAR BUREAU

MONDAY EVENING IN INTEREST OF BIG RED CROSS DRIVE FOR \$100,000.

St. Patrick's Band. Moving Pictures in France With American Expeditionary Forces. Address by Rev. E. I. Lindh. Remarks by Horace B. Cheney.

An open air rally in behalf of the big Red Cross drive for \$100,000 to be collected in this town during the week of May 20-27, both inclusive, took place at the War Bureau on Main street Monday evening and attracted a goodly gathering of interested persons, men, women and children. The St. Patrick's band and drum corps furnished music, moving pictures of war scenes in France with the American Expeditionary forces in action were thrown upon a screen on the west side of the street skirting the lawn of James W. Cheney. A moving picture machine for this purpose was stationed in the parlors of Campbell Council Knights of Columbus, upstairs over the War Bureau. Horace B. Cheney served as master of ceremonies. Rev. Eric I. Lindh, setting pastor of the Center Congregational church was the speaker.

Charles W. Holman secured the moving picture machine from the proprietor of Tara Hall, Rockville, and when that worthy found that it was to be employed for Red Cross purposes, he kindly donated the use of the machine. It became necessary to hire an operator, a Rockville man, and he had to be paid for his services. Mr. Holman secured a moving picture booth from Hartford and it also became necessary for him to bring out a state inspector to examine the arrangements for operating the picture machine before it could be put to use.

All in all there was considerable red tape attached to what the casual observer would deem a matter of minor importance. Probably not many persons outside of those who had to do with the arrangements ever gave a thought to the amount of detail necessary to present even the apparently simple demonstration provided. Horace B. Cheney made known the important fact that the St. Patrick's Band donated their services for the open air rally, and also for the big Red Cross parade of last Saturday. Mr. Cheney also stated that the band's in Saturday's demonstration furnished the music without a single cent of charge. Mr. Cheney further stated that not a single cent is to be taken out of the Red Cross funds for the very impressive advertising campaign that was carried on last week in the interest of the big drive, or that which is being conducted for a similar purpose this week. Every dollar for the display of Red Cross banners, shields, slogans, announcements, printing and newspaper advertising, floats, flags, costumes, automobiles, teams, etc., is being contributed from private sources. This latter statement was greeted with manifestations of approval. It is a fact apparent to the most casual observer that there has been much money and effort expended in the work of creating public interest in this Red Cross movement here, and it is gratifying to learn from authentic sources that every dollar of this expense is being privately met. That makes every dollar contributed to the Red Cross drive this week of fully 100 cents value to the cause for which it is being donated.

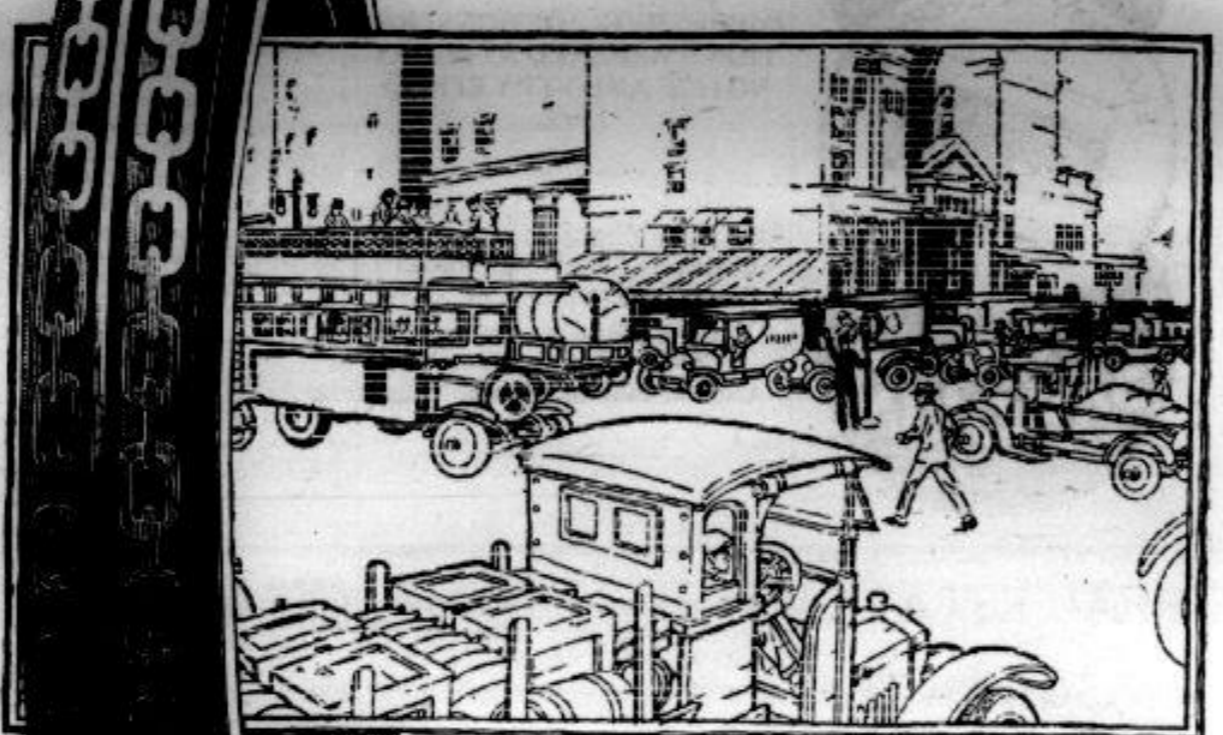
