EDITOR LYON WEDS

Members of the Connecticut newspaper fraternity and their families will be interested in the announcement that Dr. Hesselgrave is marrying Miss Helen H. Russell, on Sunday, June 23, of Fred W. Lyon, former editor of the Greenwich News and ex-president of the Connecticut Editorial Association, and Edith Cox Thomas, widow of Dr. George E. Thomas, who for many years, and until his death over a year ago, was a practicing physician in Torrington and the other wounded South Manchester soldiers were recovering. Some time ago Torrington was the scene of a tragedy, when a young man, Dr. Hesselgrave, was wounded in the leg but that he was getting on as well as could be expected. It has also been officially reported that Edmund G. Brown and Frank J. Blaisdell of Connecticut July 8 were severely wounded in action July 7. The supposition is that the brothers' lives were saved by the aid of the sea of matrimony, his first wife having died nearly two years ago.

Dr. Hesselgrave Cables

Dr. Hesselgrave sent a cablegram through the office of Cheney Brothers this week setting forth the fact that he was recovering from his wounds. He also mentioned the fact that he was fighting on the Western Front in France by being struck by a shell. Mr. Cornell was killed in action June 19. The cablegram also stated that Alexander Tournand and the other wounded South Manchester soldiers were recovering.
