



It is for us, the men and women of America who cannot go in person, to make them feel that they carry the spirit of America across the ocean when they go to fight; that in the camp or on the field, in the trench or in the hospital, in success or failure—sick or well, alive or dead—our hearts are with How can this spirit be expressed? The opportunity is here and now while our
