

THAT TOWN BUDGET GIVEN IN FULL

TAXPAYERS MAY STUDY SAME AND SEE WHAT IS AHEAD

Estimates Made By Selectmen For Probable Running Expenses During Coming Year—Items Will Be Carefully Discussed at Annual Town Meeting

Selectman Howard I. Taylor and George H. Waddell, clerk of the board of selectmen have completed the summary of estimates and income for the town budget which will be printed in the annual town report. The tables show increased appropriations in many of the town departments for the coming year. These appropriations will be submitted at the annual town meeting and the table is printed herewith for the perusal of the taxpayers.

The net cost of each appropriation for the fiscal year just closed and the amount estimated as needed for the requirements during the coming year are given. The selectmen are not recommending any tax rate this year. The rate of taxation will be automatically fixed when the appropriations are made at the annual town meeting. In other words, as soon as the taxpayers make an appropriation at the annual meeting a rate sufficient to cover all appropriations goes into effect.

It will be noted that in the estimates for the coming year is an item calling for \$10,714.56, which is a deficit from the year just closed and which will have to be provided for at the annual town meeting. This was due in large part to additional appropriations made by a special town meeting held during the early summer, and was a matter over which the Board of Selectmen has no control. The estimates are somewhat higher than was called for a year ago and may mean that a high tax rate will be necessary unless some of the appropriations are reduced. The figures follow:

No Damage Done

The selectmen are of the opinion that if the performance might be repeated Wednesday night with more intensity. Luckily clouds intervened and averted the destroying agency. There are many acres of corn, wheat and general garden and farm produce which would have been destroyed by a killing frost. It is now hoped that the danger is passed and that the maturing of the crops will be permitted to advance to full ripeness without the intervention of any destructive agency whatsoever.

The tobacco growers in the Connecticut Valley have housed the largest crop in the history of the valley in this section. Enormous prices are also being paid. It comes about that the farmers are abundantly able to pay high wages for workers in their fields and still have a handsome margin of profit for themselves. PRESERVATION OF GOOD SILAGE DEPENDS LARGELY UPON PACKING TO EXCLUDE AIR

Of Importance to Cut Brush at Proper Stage of Maturity to Get Full Value. STAGE OF MATURITY COUNTS. If Seed Crop is Desired Much Depends on Climatic Conditions and Care Given—Standard Varieties Are Very Tall.

Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture. The value of the broom corn depends largely upon the stage of maturity when harvested. If the brush is harvested when too young the fiber is weak at the base of the head, and when harvesting is delayed until the brush is overripe the fiber becomes hard and brittle. Good service should be expected from brooms made of such brush.

HOW TO HARVEST NEW BROOM CORN

Be Sure They Are Fresh and Then Use Methods Outlined. Late Summer is Not Too Late to Put Them Away—Two Ways Are Recommended by the Department of Agriculture.
