### RED CROSS CALLING FOR MANY WORKERS

Any local persons, who have the necessary qualifications and are anxious for foreign service in the Red Cross now have an opportunity of serving in an important part of our war work. The Red Cross, Atlantic division, has issued an appeal for 2,000 men and women to serve in various capacities in the Red Cross in Europe and any interested persons can get information regarding the requirements from the secretary of the local chapter, Mrs. J. H. Keith through the chairman, C. Elmore Watkins.

### THE REQUIREMENTS

The requirements are set forth in instructions received from the Atlantic Division headquarters, as follows: Applicants should be American citizens of well known integrity, ability and loyalty to our country and her Allies. The age limit for men is 25 to 40 years. The age limit for women is 18 to 30 and in exceptional cases 35 years. No man within the draft age can be accepted unless he has been placed in a Deferred Class and has received from his Local Board a Military Permit for a Passport. The fields of activity in Europe are divided into Military and Civilian Departments; the first embracing all activities for the soldiers and the second a work for civilians. These

departments are divided into zones, divisions and districts, each under the supervision of a competent head with one or more assistants. The relief work abroad requires the shipment of thousands of tons of supplies every month, the maintenance of warehouses at ports and other distributing centers, motor truck transportation systems, central stores and offices in Paris and the numerous distributing agencies throughout the departments. The organization is built along similar lines in France, Italy and the cantonments of the American troops in England.

### THE WORK

To direct and carry out the work of these great organizations the Red Cross needs a large number and variety of dependable executives and workers, who possess business experience, executive ability, resourcefulness and great human sympathy. The following outline indicates the more important requisites for the large number of workers: Representative with Army Divisions 240 Outpost Service 400 Hospital Representatives 60 Consultants at Front 30 Physicians, Surgeons, Hospital Administrators, etc. 120

### TERM OF ENROLLMENT

The minimum period of enrollment for full volunteers who pay all of their own expenses, is six months; the minimum period of enrollment for persons, the whole or any part of whose expenses are paid

by the Red Cross, is one year. NOTIFICATION. The complete record of each applicant is sent to Washington, and his final acceptance is determined by the National Headquarters subject to the approval of the War Bureau Department. After an applicant's record is received at the Division Office at least two and possibly three weeks elapse before he is advised as to whether or not he is accepted. No applicant should consider himself accepted because he has been asked to take a physical examination or to apply for a passport. It should be distinctly understood that no obligations on either side are incurred by negotiations. No applicant can consider his enrollment complete until he has been explicitly so informed, and instructed to report on a certain date preparatory to sailing.

APPOINTMENTS. The Headquarters Office in Washington forwards records and makes recommendations to the Commissioners in Europe. Definite appointments and commissions are assigned by the European Commissioners after the arrival of workers in Europe. This has been found to be the only satisfactory procedure.

### TRANSPORTATION

Full instructions regarding passports will be sent to an applicant when he is recommended to National Headquarters. Instructions regarding uniform, equipment, inoculation, transportation, date of sailing, insurance, financial arrangements, etc. will be sent to an applicant as soon as he is accepted by National Headquarters and approved by the War Department. All applicants must have robust health certified to after physical examination by physicians designated by the Red Cross; must undergo vaccination against smallpox and inoculation against typhoid and para-typhoid. Red Cross workers must be capable of hard continuous labor under uncomfortable conditions must give full time and conscientious service and must be willing to go wherever sent and obey orders cheerfully. The above information indicated in a general way the present requirements for Red Cross service. Under existing conditions however changes from week to week may be expected and we will endeavor to keep you informed.

## The Kaiser As I Knew Him For Fourteen Years

By DR. ARTHUR N. DAVIS Dentist to the German Ruler From 1904 to 1918

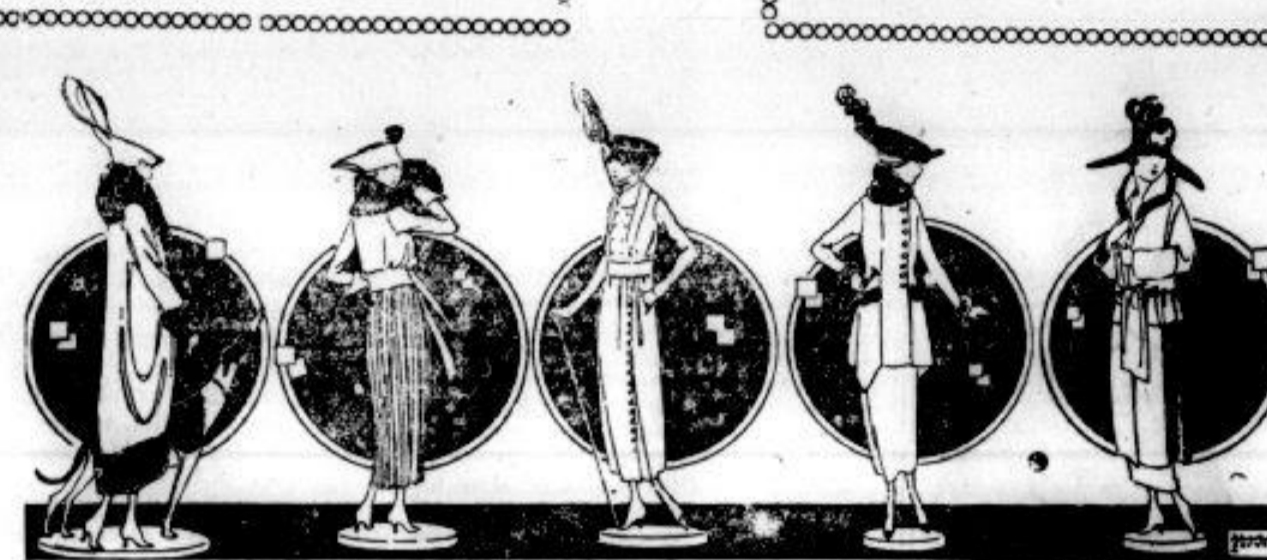

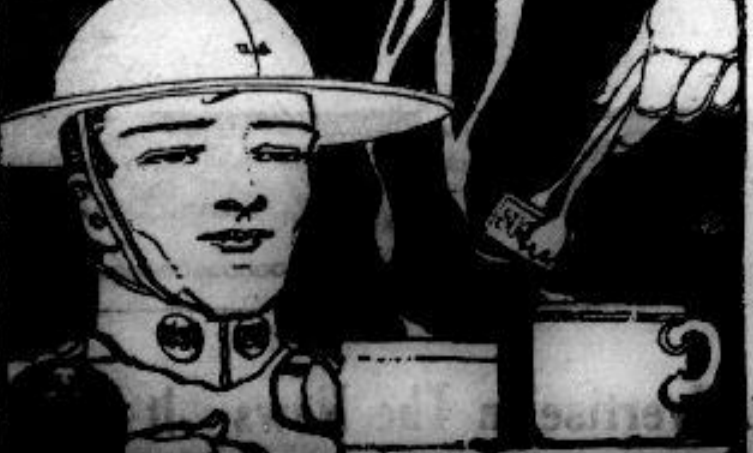

Mr. Sternal was 38 years old and a native of Poland. He is survived by a wife and two children who live in Poland.

HARRY GRANT CHENEY

AN HEROIC SACRIFICE.

SELECTIVES ENTERTAINED AND SENT SOUTH  
Twenty-seven of the thirty-two young selectives assembled at the Center church parish hall Monday evening and were given a treat by the direction of the C. O. E. Top and a couple of a fine able assistants. Remarks were made by Howard B. Cheney, E. S. C. L. G. Henshall, L. S. C. B. R. A. Felix Torrance and Angelo Bosco David Hubard, chairman of the Citizens Committee was the presiding officer and directed the general proceedings. Chairman Henshall, in behalf of the committee and of the women of this town, presented Mr. Henshall as representative of District Board, No. 1, a banner, constructed after the manner of the war service flag. It bore the legend "Local Board Division No. 1, Hartford, Conn. Consistent". The figures 1195 represented the number of young men who have been sent away from this district. The banner also contained nine gold stars to indicate the number of men from this district who have died since entering the service. Comfort kits and packages of cigarettes were given to the selectives.

The young men assembled at the South Manchester postoffice Wednesday morning and were taken by automobile to Wells Hall, East Hartford, and entrained at the East Hartford station at 8:12. A special train took them to Old Point Comfort, Va., where they were expected to arrive yesterday afternoon.

The new service flag was borne in the procession from Wells Hall to the railroad station. The flag is to be kept at headquarters in East Hartford and used on all similar occasions.

AT EMERGENCY HOSPITAL  
THIRTY-ONE CASES STILL  
An inquiry made at the Emergency Hospital in Cheney Hall at noon today brings the information that there are 31 cases of influenza there. There is just one of the number that is classed as critical. That is the case of an individual named Carmella Pietragallo of 190 Oak street. The other cases seem at present to show no especial cause for alarm although they are not by any means out of danger. Given the care attention and general sanitary conditions which are provided for patients at the Emergency hospital there is ample reason for believing that the remainder have excellent chances for recovery. It is the belief at the Emergency Hospital that the epidemic is beginning to subside. There is still great necessity for persons to exercise great care in the matter of exposure to conditions which give rise to the disease, such as colds, coughs, and influenza. Avoidance of crowds, and especially of food properly cooked, avoiding of all exposures, maintaining the physical standard as high as possible are all things which are well worthy the most serious attention of the public.

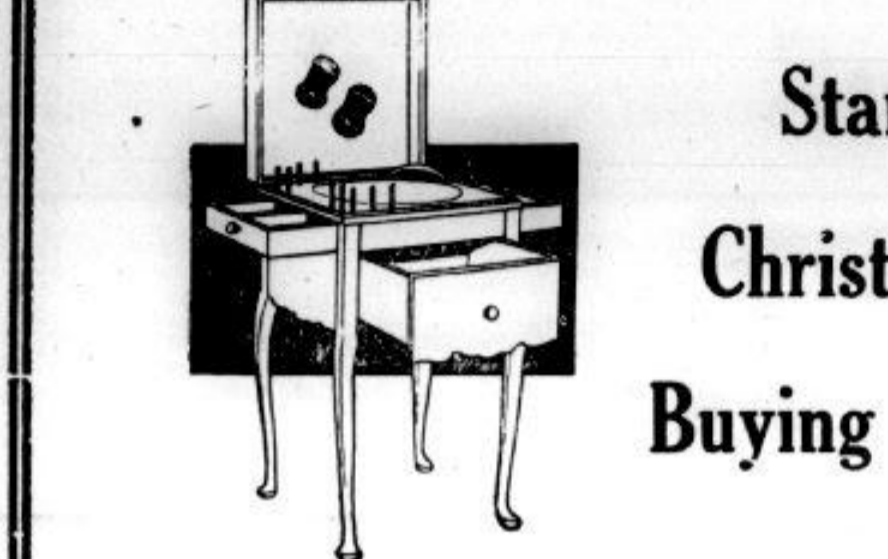
