Manchester is going to lead a willing and unopposed ear to the Near East call for funds. Although the millions who are suffering untold agonies there are remote from this prosperous, happy community, they are human beings, and as members of the great family of mankind, and who have a surplus regard it as a matter of conscience to give them a little, even though very little. There are 400,000 orphans starving and almost cladless, always tired, always moving on from place to place. There are 800,000 adults in dire straits.

NEED FOR RELIEF

The field operations include not only Asia Minor, with those portions of Armenia and Syria that are in the Ottoman Empire, but also the large section of Armenia until recently dominated by the Russian Army, as well as the Russian, Cyprian, Persian, Mesopotamian, Palestine and portions of Egypt and Macedonia, into which regions Armenians, Syrians and Greeks have fled in large numbers. Of the Armenians about 1,000,000 were massacred or driven to their death during the summer of 1915 and the remainder within Turkish dominions were deported from their homes into the deserts or other regions where self support was practically impossible.

AMERICAN COMMITTEE

"With the exception of the work being done by the Jewish Relief Committee, the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief is the only agency organized for affording a relief in this great area of the Near East. In Persia and Russia some small British funds are spent by the field commissioners of the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief in the Turkish Empire."

CLAIM CURE FOR GLANDERS

Italian Savant's Discovery, if True, Will Have Brought Them the Gratitude of Mankind.

The reviews of medicine and veterinary surgery speak of important researches looking to the cure of glanders, which affects horses and may also attack man, who almost invariably succumb.

At the beginning of the war the spread of glanders, especially among the quadrupeds of the 7th Italian Army, suggested to Colonel Commanding Dr. K. Bertetti, director of the veterinary service of the army, the idea of utilizing the victims of glanders in medical experiments in regard to its curability.

PUT HYPNOTISM TO GOOD USE

Australian Physician Announces That He Has Cured War Stammering by His Employment.

Writing in the Medical Journal of Australia, Dr. Clarence G. Godfrey states that during the past two years a number of cases have been referred to him for treatment by hypnotic suggestion, in which stammering or stuttering had developed, or had been revived, after years of disappearance, as the result of shell shock or of various war stresses. Sometimes a hypnotized patient has been told to keep on repeating some well-known nursery rhyme and not to cease at the signal to awake, although in the middle of the rhyme he had been talking. He will usually manifest his astonishment at finding himself talking without difficulty. Sometimes a patient will converse on waking without realizing that his stammering has disappeared until his attention is drawn to it with amazing rapidity. In one case the patient spoke perfectly in sleep at the first attempt to hypnotize him, although he had had a very bad stutter for eight months past.

Little-Known Hero

Of the many stories of heroism during the war, one which official records do not mention is that of a young man who, although he was a member of the censorship in the anti-aircraft defenses of London (the "Bag" district), he has for four years has been to find and dispose of German aerial bombs that failed to explode when dropped on London.

As many devout souls have prayed for him, he wished to convert the whole world, and as all desire, he prayed fervently, and he was granted his wish. France knew of him and there he labored for a time, as he did in Italy and the Thyrrenian sea islands. But it was to Ireland his heart turned most eagerly and he was permitted a vision in which he saw the people of Erin stretch forth their arms to him in supplication, and this vision determined him to undertake the difficult task of the conversion of Ireland. He traveled to Rome to get the permission of the pope and his bishop, and labor and himself to that dignitary. He was consecrated bishop and, having received his instructions and having been blessed, he began his journey to his new mission. The inhabitants of Erin were considered in an advanced state of civilization, and St. Patrick began his labors by denouncing Druidism, establishing his followers by the wonderful deeds he accomplished in the name of God, and by the simple compromise of adding eight and nine together. But when their elders are interested, the children are steadied, interest is prevented, and the garden enterprise is carried through to the harvest.
