Eggs In Waterglass

During the past two years, fresh egg prices from August 1st to March 1st have averaged twice as high as the lowest spring prices. Cold storage reports from 1918-19 show that eighty-four per cent of all the eggs stored went in between April 1 and May 1. This then, must be the season of lowest prices.

The cost of preserving eggs at home should not exceed three cents per dozen. Waterglass (Sodium Silicate) can be purchased at any durg store for twenty-five or thirty cents per quart, or less in quantity. Use one quart of waterglass with nine quarts of water which has been boiled and cooled, for each fifteen dozen eggs preserved.
