## TRIBUNE EDITOR GOT HIS SALARY

ORDERED NONE PAID TO EMPLOYEES WHO ENTERED SERVICE BUT TOOK HIS OWN AGAINST WAR WITH GERMANY

Joseph Medill Patterson and Writer of "Million Dollar Editorial" Testify in Defense of Paper in the Ford Case.

Mr. Clemens, Mich.—Witnesses for the Chicago Tribune in the defense of its action in labeling Henry Ford an "anarchist" included Joseph Medill Patterson, one of the editors of the Tribune and Clifford S. Raymond, writer of what is now known as the "million dollar editorial."

In the course of the testimony it was developed that Mr. Patterson issued an order when Tribune men began to enter the service of the country after the United States entered the war, that no wages were to be paid to the departing men, whether they had dependents or not, but that he personally continued to draw his salary of \$20,000 a year after he went to France.

Both Mr. Patterson and Mr. Raymond also testified that they knew Germany wanted to see the United States at war with Mexico but that Lincoln was assassinated before she succeeded to the presidency.

Arrested in Belgium. Counsel for Mr. Ford asked Mr. Patterson if it was not true that he had gone to Germany during the early days of the war for the purpose of writing the German side of the controversy.
