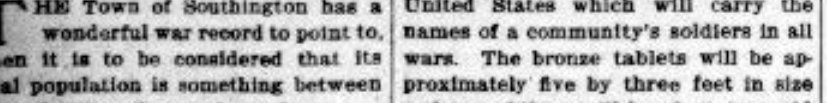

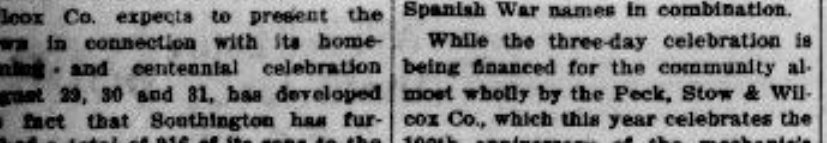

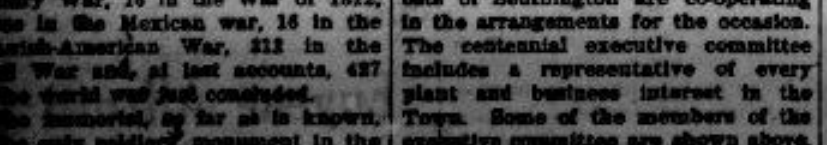

"WIN RIGHT TO HOLD MEETINGS Labor Leaders Score Victory Over Municipal Officials of McKeesport. TO HOLD SESSIONS IN HALLS It Had Been Alleged That the Authorities Threatened Organizers When They Persisted in Indoor Meetings.

GENERAL LABOR NOTES Over 70,000 Belgians have been repatriated from England, but there are still 100,000 who want to stay, according to some office figures. British labor unions object. Eleven hundred machinists, tool and die makers on a strike and locked out from a score of shops, went back to work at Chicago. They were granted the demands for the union scale of wages and hours.

AGAINST "ONE BIG UNION" Canadian Labor Organization Goes on Record as Also Opposing General Sympathetic Strike. A definite stand in the fight of labor organizations affiliated with the American Federation of Labor against the One Big Union movement has been taken by the Federated Council of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Employees, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees. This organization took part in a strike about two months ago and its troubles were amply settled by the Canadian Railway Board of Adjustment. The leaders of the organization declare that they are directly opposed to the general sympathetic strike and that the One Big Union as demanded by western radicals and that they can be counted upon not to enter into any general strike of railway workers which may be called.

OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST Two hundred men and women optical workers met at Chicago and organized the Optical Workers' Union. Employees of the Ochs, Inc. (retail book store) at Madison, Conn. in a current that followed the adoption by management of a bill splitting the eight hour day into the coal mining industry. Members of the Letter Carriers' association of Detroit have petitioned congress to grant salary increases of \$500 a year to each carrier and postal clerk and an increase of 35 cents an hour to temporary employees. The carriers request in the petition that in case this is not done immediately the employees be informed so that they may obtain better paying work elsewhere without delay.

Accidents Increased. There was a great increase in the number of industrial accidents recently by owing to the introduction of work people into unfamiliar places in the industrial plants. It is now being brought down by the return of skilled laborers to their old places.

BUILT ON HISTORIC GROUND New York City's Big Structures Stand on Land That is of Sacred Memory. The land on which the Equitable building stands, and the territory around and about it, is of sacred memory so far as early American history is concerned. Just across the way on Broadway was Burns' coffee house, where the Revolution really started. Here was erected at a later date, the City Hall, the scene of many memorable functions during the early days of the republic.

At which time the post office moved to the present federal building in City Hall park. On the site of the present address, at Pine, Nassau and Wall streets, and called him in a quarter of an hour, in front of the building was a cage for criminals, with whipping post and stocks—but not the kind of stocks they sell these days. When independence was declared the building became the capitol and was called Federal Hall. Here the Declaration of Independence was read from the steps in 1776, and here also Washington was inaugurated first president of the United States, in 1789.

"I wish to insist upon the high importance of interposing no obstacles to the organization of labor, which is regarded to be an essential part of the industrial system," said William Howard Taft in an address before the National Hardware association.

BIG GUN NOT WORTH WHILE

American Ordnance Experts' Could Outside the Huns in Savagery, but Are Not Likely To.

The Hun 70-mill gun which Paris was harassed is doubtless still regarded by many as evidence of the much-advertised German mechanical ingenuity.

Finance experts have long been aware of the possibility of such a gun. But they have also been aware of its impracticability owing to a lack of tonnage for controlling its effective range in such destructively work as shelling a great city regardless of whom or what was hit.

As an object lesson our ordnance department has desisted, without actually building a supergun which dwarfs the German machine into insignificance. The data recently made public through the Scientific American, fairly breathes the life into the gun. It carries a 225 ton shell and weighs 325 tons. The pressure developed is 45,000 pounds to the square inch. The projectile has a muzzle velocity of 3,200 feet-seconds, and develops the terrific energy of 300,000 foot-ton. Its range is 121 miles, approximately the distance between Chicago and Madison, Wis. Its time of flight is four minutes, and it soars heavenward to a height of 46 miles.

This is awesome; but the cold-blooded expert points out that after all, the gun delivers only a 400-pound shell, containing 100 pounds of high explosive, and that such a gun would cost \$2,500,000. A bombing plane costing \$50,000 would drop a 1,000-pound bomb with greater accuracy of aim.

The German supergun demonstrates the savagery of the Hun—the Berserker madness that strikes regardless of whom it strikes. But it also demonstrates an intellectual weakness—the lack of comprehension of mechanism's sake a complicated piece of machinery operates its administration because it is complicated or difficult, regardless of its practicability.
