TOWN ADVERTISEMENT BOARD OF SELECTMEN TOWN OF MANCHESTER DECISION

Of the Selectmen of the Town of Manchester, Conn., upon the petition of Wm E. Gleason et al for the establishment of building lines on the west and Spruce Street on the east and presented to the Board of Selectmen October 23rd, 1919.

Upon petition of Wm E. Gleason et al for building lines on the west and Spruce Street on the east, and presented to the Board of Selectmen Oct. 23rd, 1919, the selectmen of the Town of Manchester, Conn. acting under and pursuant to Sec. 9 (44) (House Bill No. 1029), Special Laws of Connecticut, 1915, entitled "An Act amending an Act concerning the nomination of candidates for public office, and the number, powers, and duties of town officers in the Town of Manchester," approved April 9th, 1913,

ORDERED: That from and after the 5th day of November 1919 building lines on said highway known as School Street be, and they are hereby designated and established as follows, to-wit:-

LEGAL OPINION GIVEN BY TOWN COUNSEL ON AIDING COMMUTERS WITH TOWN FUNDS

As the commuters' committee which attended the meeting of the board of selectmen by invitation Friday evening had asked the town fathers to contribute \$1,000 to the town's money and the officials had replied that they would ascertain their legal limitations regarding the town's funds, Chairman Aaron Johnson was asked to report.

Mr. Johnson said the board of selectmen held a special meeting on Friday evening and again at 7 o'clock Monday evening to take up the commuter's cause and that the following opinion from Town Counsel Alexander Arnott should be given to the town fathers could not give \$1,000 of the town's funds to any body of people:

Mysterious Light Even more mysterious than the phenomenon of the faint moonlight glow in the sky exactly opposite the sun, is a still less familiar luminous feature of the night. This is a certain red light, which is visible when the moon is absent. Prof. E. E. Barnard of the University of Chicago finds that it differs from ordinary auroral light in its appearance in all parts of the sky, and that it is not probably any form of cirrus or cirro-stratus cloud. It seems to emanate from a thin stratum in appearance in all parts of the sky, and the source of its light being unknown. It may be quite noticeable as a streaky luminous haze, sometimes appears in bands or horizontal lines, and is absent for several years, though at other times there is a great deal of it. It is detrital, exactly, over the bars, they matting visible with a faint, steady light for a considerable time.

TOWN WILL FIGHT RAISE IN FARES AND ZONE SYSTEM COMMUTERS PETITIONS PRESENTED TO UTILITIES COMMISSION

MANCHESTER'S NEW BRIDGE COMMISSIONER Petitions Have 500 Signatures, All Former Trolley Patrons—\$1,200 Raised to Carry on Battle—Request Early Hearing.

It was a busy night last night for the Manchester Commuters Association. The members assembled in the town hall at 7:30 and held a meeting previous to the calling of the special town meeting. After the town meeting to perfect their plans for presenting their petitions to the public utilities commission. President Isahai Symington presided. It was announced that the petitions contained the names of 500 commuters. No effort had been made to get any names on the petitions other than the regular trolley commuters. It was also announced that the finance committee had collected the sum of \$1,200 to carry on the battle. A transportation committee consisting of Matthias Spiese, James R. Voth and C. S. McHale was appointed to coordinate their transportation efforts.

The men from this town can go on this car to Hartford and then return on the Boston express due here at 6:45 at night.

More Than \$2,400 Pledged for Permanent Home Building Fund. Energetic Committee in Charge. Will Have Basketball

As a special meeting of Campbell Council Knights of Columbus in Foresters Hall last Monday evening the report of the committee on new quarters for the council was heard. This enlarged committee extended the scope of its work by determining to create a fund for a proposed building to be erected and owned by the council. This action was taken at a meeting of the council, to which five members each were selected from its membership and these men set to work immediately to secure pledges of cash for the proposed fund.

At the meeting of October 27, \$500 were pledged by the members then at the meeting. Dr. E. G. Dolan led with a pledge of \$100 for a starter. This action inspired others to be generously disposed, with the result noted above. The five teams arranged to conduct a general canvass of the members of the council for further signatures to the pledge sheet for ready cash to start the building fund.
