

MUCH ACTIVITY BY K. OF C. TEMPORARY SOCIAL QUARTERS SECURED ON MAIN STREET

More Than \$2,400 Pledged for Permanent Home Building Fund. Energetic Committee in Charge. Will Have Basketball

As a special meeting of Campbell Council Knights of Columbus in Foresters Hall last Monday evening the report of the committee on new quarters for the council was heard. It was decided to accept the report which included a recommendation that the new building be located on the north side of the building and adjoins the reception room on the main street front.

Last Sunday a goodly delegation from the council met at the headquarters of the Knights of Columbus. As soon as they were assembled the committee reported that they had completed the plan for the new building which is now in process of removal on Oak street near Main and transfer it to the new location in the Furnell building.

This enlarged committee determined the scope of its work by extending to create a fund for a proposed building to be erected and owned by the members of the council. To that end five teams of five members each were selected from its membership and these men set to work immediately to secure pledges of cash for the proposed fund.

At the meeting of October 27, \$500 were pledged by the members then at the meeting. Dr. E. G. Dolan led with a pledge of \$100 for a starter. This action inspired others to be generously disposed with the result noted above. The five teams arranged to conduct a general canvass of the members of the council for further signatures to the pledge sheet for ready cash to start the building fund.

Chairman Fred H. Wall had a large blackboard in position near the station of the grand knight. Upon this scroll appeared the names of the respective captains. Spaces were set apart for the amounts of pledges each was to report and the names of the several captains were listed. As the several captains were called upon for their reports the amount they announced was chalked upon the blackboard. It was so arranged that the announcements were made in the order of rank known. The report of each captain was received with cheers. The names of all those who signed the pledge and the amounts they pledged are listed below.

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GOVERNMENT TAKES OVER WELFARE WORK IN ARMY

Y. M. C. A. and All Organizations Cease Campaign Activities November 1st.

New York.—In compliance with official orders from the War Department, the War Work Council, headed by Y. M. C. A. on Nov. 1, transferred to the War Department all welfare work activities, as conducted in the temporary buildings erected during the war, which were situated in the continental limits of the United States, according to arrangements previously made by John W. McCook, national executive secretary of the Y. M. C. A. war work in America.

The War Work Council has requested the 1300 respective contract activities in its possession by Y. M. C. A. units in camps throughout the United States to consider favorably the desirability of the complete transfer of these welfare work activities to the War Department, which is now officially established.
