## REPORT MADE ON TOWN BUDGET

In preparing the town budget for the coming year, last Friday evening Clerk George H. Wadell informed the board of selectmen that most of the appropriations for the coming year would be the same as for the past year. Last year's appropriations for schools totaled \$174,000. The board of estimates figured that next year's needs would call for \$172,915.

The following estimates for the various departments are the same as last year: Charities, \$40,000; highways, \$40,000; oiling, \$10,000; walks and curbing, \$10,000; parks and spraying, \$4,000; lighting, \$19,500; Memorial Day, \$800; board of health, \$8,000; building inspector, \$200; notes, \$10,000; child welfare work, \$2,000; state aid roads, \$2,000.

An appropriation of \$4,800 will be necessary for the work of making the assessment. Only \$1,500 of the \$4,000 appropriation made for a past year having been expended, \$3,175 will be needed for war medals. The miscellaneous appropriation is from \$17,000 to \$19,000. Police appropriation is to be increased from \$15,000 to \$20,000. \$4,000 will be needed for constables. Instead of \$3,000, the amount appropriated for the past year.

It will be impossible to determine what the tax rate will be at this time. The assessors are at present working on a re-assessment of the taxable property of the town and until their work is finished it will not be known what the town's grand list will be. It is expected that the grand list can be ascertained by some five millions of dollars. Even the assessors are not sure what the figures will be. Until the amount of the grand list can be ascertained definitely and the appropriations for the various departments are made by the voters, the tax rate can not be known. It is now expected that the laying of the tax rate will be postponed from its annual town meeting next month to an adjourned meeting next March.

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## HELP ALIENS BECOME CITIZENS

BRING NATURALIZATION COURT OFFICIAL TO SOUTH MANCHESTER

Have Done So Before Show Foreign Born Way To Protection of Stars and Stripes. Office Holders and Seekers Should Lead

Judge Edwin S. Thomas will hold a session in the United States District Court in Hartford on Wednesday, September 29, for the naturalization of aliens. There are about 300 aliens, and soldiers summoned to appear the largest number, over 100, are from the United States. The session will open at 10 a. m., and because of the number who have been summoned, the expectation is that it will fill the courtroom. It will be the only session for the naturalization of aliens before the November election. The soldiers have been summoned to appear at 10 a. m. Under an act of Congress, they are not required to pay fees to be admitted and, by presenting evidence of an honorable discharge from the army or navy they may be admitted as citizens, regardless of the time they have been in this country.

Some eight years ago arrangements were made to hold sessions in South Manchester for the naturalization of aliens. This was found to be a very great convenience and did much toward encouraging such persons to become citizens of the United States. A clerk of the United States district court came here and administered the oath to all persons desiring to swear allegiance to the United States and recognize allegiance to the government under which they were born.

This is a subject about which the committee in charge has also decided to supply a harvest supper following the afternoon session of the court. The supper will be served at the High School hall at six o'clock.

Robert J. Smith, secretary of the board of assessors, announced last evening that the board had completed their inspection of all the taxable properties in town and had revised the list of the property owners.

The board had made no estimate of the amount of the increase over the figures of the previous year. It is expected that the increase will be in the neighborhood of 10 per cent.

The board will meet next Monday evening at 7 o'clock to consider the list of the property owners and to make the final assessment for the year 1921.

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
