"CAMOUFLAGE." THOUGH comparatively new

The use of branches of trees as a screen for Malcolm's men is mentioned in "Macbeth." while the American Indian has long been an adept in painting his body so that it would blend in with the surrounding country-an adaptation of nature's principle of "protective coloration," the oldest camouflage of all. 
