LANDSLIDE PUTS HARDING AND COOLIDGE IN

Continued from page one... Harding broke records. Bottom, which has been consistently Democratic in recent years, except in 1908 when McKinley carried it over Bryan, showed the effect of the drift of the people as a whole to Harding on a scale of more than 50,000.

New York city, however, was even more surprising. The city went for Taft in 1908 by less than 16,000; it seems to have given Harding a plurality of more than 400,000. Buffalo gave Harding a plurality of 40,000.

The effect of the Harding sweep showed everywhere. Though the southern states stood fast, Harding had carried two wards in Atlanta and two in Louisiana parishes. In the Middle West, Indiana and Kansas each gave him more than 200,000 plurality; Iowa, more than 300,000; Michigan nearly 400,000.

Reports from the Far West, due to the wide extent of the campaign and the difference in time, were slow in coming in, but there was every indication that the Western States would had re-elected Wilson in 1916 and almost all the East went for Hughes had turned solidly to the Republican nominee this year.

Harding carried his home precinct, 373 to 76. It was Democratic four years ago, though the home town was in the Republican column in the 1916 election. He carried Cretz homes town of Dayton, Ohio. He carried Hyde Park, N. K., the home town of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic nominee for Vice President, by 279 votes to 194, and he carried President Wilson's home district in Princeton, N. J., by a majority estimated at about five to one.

At 11 o'clock election night Governor Cox's newspaper, The Dayton News, conceded the election of Harding, and George White, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, followed his candidate's example a few minutes later.

The Republican sweep carried with it considerably increased majorities in both houses of Congress. Indications were that Republicans would have fifty-three senators to the Democratic forty-three, but Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican National Committee, was claiming a majority of forty-four.

Now that election is over people generally about the country will re-examine the events of their lives and endeavor to restore business to normalcy. An honest playing of the cards on the table face up is demanded. No camouflage. No attempt to further fool the people.

MEMORIAL HOSPITAL FITTINGLY DEDICATED ON ARMISTICE DAY

Grateful Tribute of Town At Large To Men And Women Who Served in World War

GREAT OUTPOURING OF TOWNSPEOPLE Inspection Days Continued Today, Saturday and Sunday From 1 to 7 P. M.

READY FOR PATIENTS SOON

The new Memorial hospital which was formally dedicated yesterday in a program fitting to the soldiers and sailors who represented this town in the service and a memorial to those gallant boys who gave up their lives in the great war, started about one year ago the building is now practically completed and finished.

It was thrown open for public inspection yesterday. It will be ready for occupancy by patients as soon as a delayed sprinkler system is installed, which may be a matter of two weeks.

The Memorial Hospital is up-to-date in every particular, and will have a staff of resident and visiting doctors and nurses that rank with any in the state.

Upon entering the hospital one sees a bronze tablet bearing the names of those who died in the service of their country and another with the names of those who were in the service. Great care has been taken to make this list complete and accurate and cast in enduring bronze to preserve for future generations a permanent record of Manchester's part in the great war.

CHEERY APPOINTMENTS The furnishings, most of them the work of individual artists, are of exceptionally fine quality for a hospital and resulted one of them to a private home. Easy chairs, a sofa, some with massive frames and deep leather seats, others of wicker work with figured upholstery in cheerful colors. Rugs, window draperies and potted plants add to the homelike atmosphere of the place. The work here in the Armistice Day parade yesterday afternoon. They haven't forgotten the art of "hiking" either. They did much of it while overseas and can do it now when necessary.
