Wife Fight Wage Reduction.
The United Textile Workers of America went on record at the last session of their convention to continue the fight for the 40-hour week in all textile centers and the reduction of working hours had not been adopted. The delegates thought it a good policy to campaign for a universal 40-hour week.

John Golden was asked what the attitude of the union was on the matter of wage reduction as announced by some New England mills, and stated that the United Textile Workers of America were opposed to any wage reduction and would have the backing of a substantial majority.

Workers to Co-operate.
A consumers' co-operative has been organized by the Massachusetts branch of the Independent Workers' Circle of America, an organization which has been in existence since 1908 and which has a membership of nearly 7,000.

More Workers Than Jobs.
For the first time since the beginning of the war period there are more men looking for jobs than there are jobs to give them.

The conditions in Chicago, which are reported as bad, are reflected elsewhere in the Chicago yellow iron and steel works in Pennsylvania, which have been large reductions in the working force and the curtailment of employment is said to be only the beginning of what may be expected during the fall and winter.

Japanese City's Big Project.
A scheme which will result in the expenditure of about \$100,000,000 and \$200,000,000 is now under way in Kobe, Japan. It calls for the construction of a train line throughout the city and residential districts in the hills beyond the city limits. It is also planned to develop several new residential sections for the working class in the districts outside the city that are now undeveloped.

Central American Labor Federation.
Formation of a Central American Labor Federation has been planned by delegates of the labor unions of Guatemala and Salvador, and labor unions of other Central American states will be invited to participate. Plans for the organization contemplate the appointment of a representative committee made up of one delegate from each state.
