

but during the cold months many hens suffer from lack of exercise. Close confinement without exercise is not conducive to getting the best results object of beauty. conducive to getting the best results from a flock, although the feed provided may be the best, for idle hens soon grow too fat to lay. It is almost impossible to give laying hens that are confined too much exercise. The fowls may be encouraged to exercise in various ways, such as suspending cabbage heads, beets, etc., so that the birds have to jump for them, and scaftering grain in the litter. The litter should be from four to eight inches deep and may consist of straw (wither cut or whole), hay, leaves, buckwheat hulls, shredded corn fodder, or any like convenient material. The hens should be kept hungry enough so that they will work diligently all day for the corn scattered in this litter, say poultry specialists of the United States Department of Agricul-United States Department of Agriculture.
