INAUGURAL ADDRESS OF PRESIDENT HARDING

Twenty-Eighth President of U. S.

Association for Counsel. America Anxious to Participate in Any Seemly Program Likely to Lessen War and Promote World Peace

TRADE TIES BIND CLOSELY Make Offensive Warfare So Hateful That Governments Which Resort to it Must Prove Their Cause or Stand as Outlaws Before Bar of Civilization.

Washington—The Inaugural Address of President Warren G. Harding was as follows: My countrymen—When one surveys the world about him after the great stress, the inspiring example of freedom and civilization are inseparable, and though both were threatened, we find them now secure; and there comes to Americans the profound assurance that our representative government is the highest expression and surest guaranty of both.

Standing in this presence, amidst the solemnity of this occasion, feeling the emotions which no one may know until he senses the great weight of responsibility for himself, I must utter my belief in the divine inspiration of the founding fathers. Surely there must have been God's intent in the making of this new world republic. Ours is an organic law which had but one ambiguity, and we saw that effaced in a baptism of sacrifice and with union maintained, the nation supreme and its concord inspiring. We have seen the world tread its hopeful gaze on the great truths on which the founders wrought. We have seen civil, human and religious liberty verified and glorified. In the bettering of the old world we see our experiment; today our foundations of political and social belief stand unshaken, a precious inheritance to our people, an inspiring example of freedom and civilization to all mankind. Let us express renewed and strengthened devotion in grateful reverence for the immortal beginning and utter our confidence in the supreme fulfillment.

Progress Proves Wisdom The recorded progress of our republic, materially increasing its freedom and wisdom of the laborer policy of non-involvement in old world affairs. Confident of our ability to work out our own destiny and nobly guarding our right to do so, we seek no part in directing the destinies of the old world. We do not mean to be entangled, we will accept no responsibility except our own conscience and judgment, in such matters, we determine. Our eyes never will be blind to a developing menace, our ears never deaf to the call of civilization. We

A woman discovered silk and the secret was kept for many centuries. Finally a woman told the secret of its culture and manufacture to a man and silk became a household word in all parts of the world.

**STORY OF SILK INTERESTINGLY TOLD**

The story of silk is a most interesting one. It is a story of discovery and of the struggle for power between the East and the West. The secret of silk was discovered in China and for centuries it was kept there. It was not until the sixteenth century that the secret was revealed to the world.

The Emperor Theobald forbade the use of Rome as a pattern for silk because he considered the custom effeminate and many Romans denounced the wearing of silks from the island of Oros by women. It was claimed that the extreme disapproval of the silk fabric made such costumes indecent. It was the first dress reform movement in history. The first standard price fixed for silk was in 1284 A. D. when he decided that the merchants should not exact more than eight pieces of cloth (about \$15) for a pound of silk of good ready to wear quality. The price raised the silk market.

The silk of that day, although of more quality, would not compare favorably with the silk of today in its beauty of coloring, weave or durability. It excelled it only in price.

By the year 1293 silken garments were worn by the English court and although it was not until the close of the following century that England took up the silk industry during the reign of Edward III. While France engaged in the industry in the early part of the thirteenth century it was not until almost three hundred years later that the trade became well established through the efforts of Henry of Navarre who spent more than \$200,000 of his own funds in experiments.

Whenever silk was introduced it depended upon the favor of women who were their chief users then as they are today when it virtually is impossible for a woman to dress herself without it. 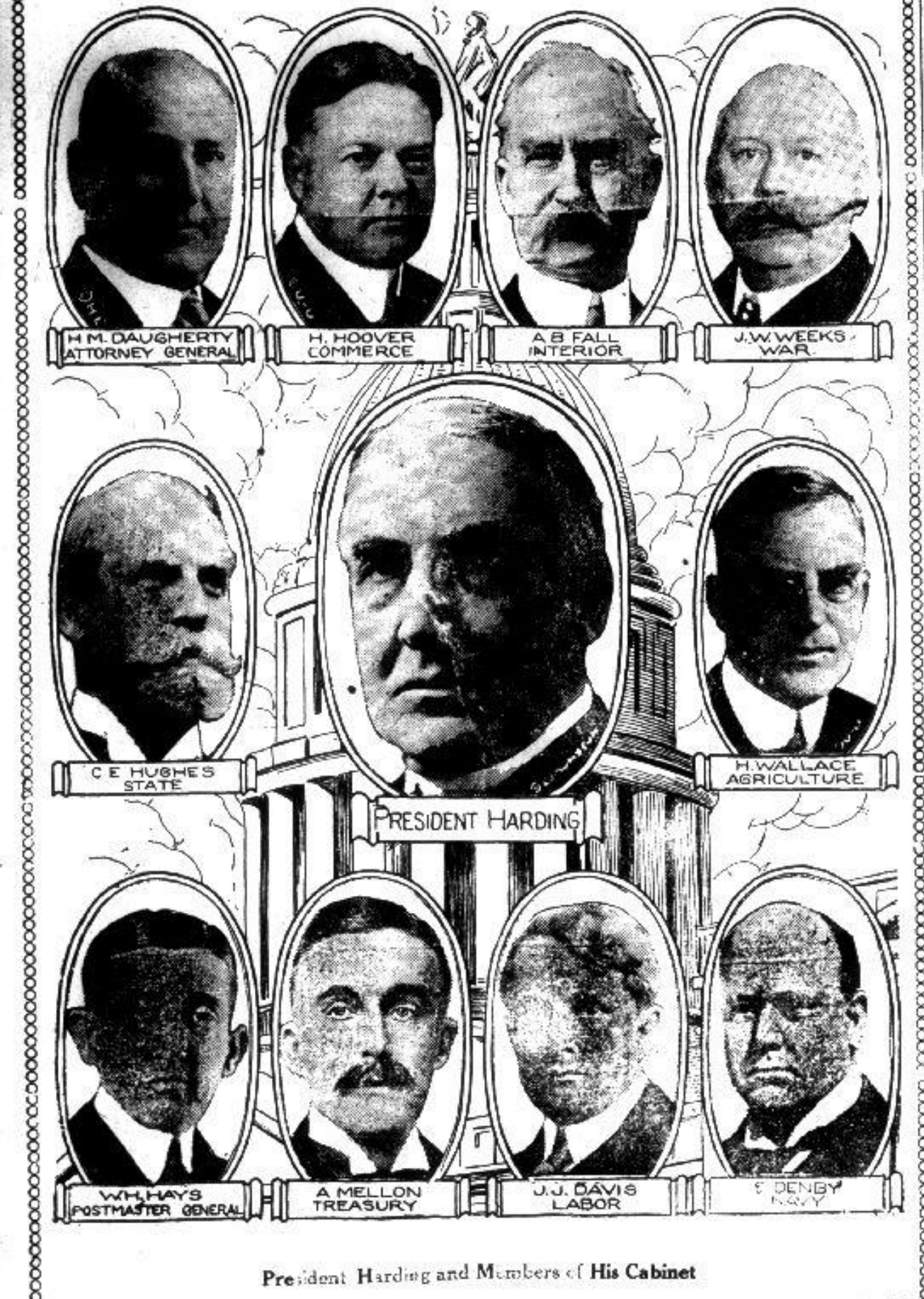
