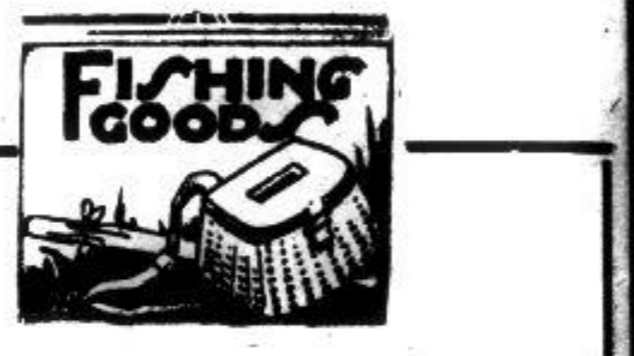

It was also certain whether Rev. E. A. Blake, who has been supplying the pulpit of the North Methodist Church since the death of Rev. W. H. Ridgeway, would be retained.
