A PROCLAMATION
At this season of the year, when all life is being renewed, it is fitting that we consider the debt which we owe to Nature, which has blessed us so abundantly. It is our duty to express in some measure our appreciation of the gifts which surround us and which we accept so freely. To this end I hereby appoint Friday, the sixth day of May, 1921, as

Chief of Police Samuel G. Gordon said that

Tobacco growers in this section who did not sell their crops last fall are under the painful necessity of taking a tremendous loss at the present time or else carry over their crops to another season. Some of the growers in the Connecticut Valley are unable to raise the money to flow their crops until next year, or are obliged to sell at present prices or go out of business.

In cases where growers cannot furnish either, they are confronted with the necessity of withdrawing from the field, the conditions in their case are severe and irreparable. It is a heartbreaking predicament for a grower who has expended his money and labor on the crop, only to find that he cannot get it out of the ground.

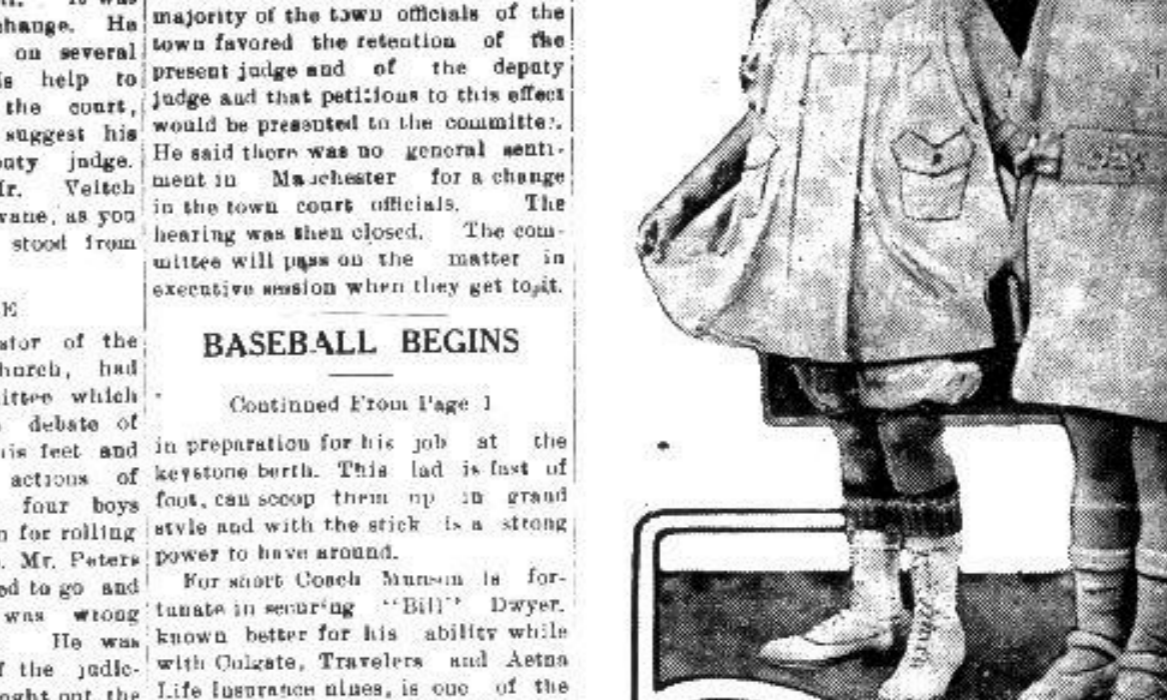

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MAPLE SIRUP SUPPLY FOR FAMILY

In sections where sugar maple trees grow, or where sugar cane or sorghum are grown, the farmer may produce all the sirup the family consumes. Many farmers of the North Atlantic states produce their own maple sirup, and in the southern states the home production of cane and sorghum is to a considerable extent in parts of the North. It is not unusual for southern families to produce ten to 25 gallons of sirup for home consumption, making a very important contribution to the family living.

IMPLEMENTS FOR CLEANING HOUSE

Proper Tools and Materials Are Essential for Performing Tasks Easily and Quickly. KEEP THEM IN RIGHT PLACE. Ideal Arrangement is to Have Complete Set Stored in Orderly Manner in Convenient and Well-Ventilated Closet.

Should be cleaned. Dry mops may be used or oiled mops renewed by pouring a few drops of light kerosene oil on any good floor oil into an old dish or a tin box and setting the mop in those for a day or two. The mop may be carried with a little oil and allowed to stand until the oil spreads through the strings.

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FARM POULTRY

WIRE FOR FENCING POULTRY. Two-inch Mesh is Most Commonly Used and Can Be Purchased at Moderate Price.

Wiring, two-inch mesh is commonly used for fencing poultry yards and can be bought at a moderate price. Several runs are advisable. Three-fourths of an inch or one-inch wire should be used for the bottom wire.
