Canning clubs have been instrumental in stimulating interest in canning on the farm. The drying of fruits and vegetables, an old farm art until recently on the decline, has been revived quite generally within the past two years.* This process offers a good means of preserving perishables without entailing expense for containers, as

well, and to hulld up a strong, vigor-Milk, being a liquid, is sometimes classed with water, ten, and coffee, simply as a beverage, by those who do not understand its value as food. This is a great mistake. If all the water were to be driven from a quart of tea or coffee, almost nothing would be left and the little that remained would have practically no value as food. If, on the other hand, the water were driven from a quart of whole milk, there would be left about half a cupful of the very hest food substances, including butterfat, and a kind of sugar not so sweet as granulated sugar and known as "milk sugar," together with other materials needed to make muscles, bones, teeth and other parts of the body. 

WANT BOND ISSUE AFTER REFERENDUM

Selectman James E. Aitken brought before the members of the board of selectmen last Friday evening the advisability of the town issuing bonds to pay for some of the big permanent improvement jobs which must be undertaken in the near future. Selectman Aitken is auxious to have Main street from the Center south rebuilt but he is not willing to saidle the entire cost upon the present taxpavers by means of a town tax He believes better satisfaction would result if the payments were extended over a period of years and the burden of the costs spread among a larger number of taxpayers.

The town needs a new mortuary wanlt at the East cemetery and this will cost upwards of \$25 000. There is talk of erecting a new town building to replace the town hall and hall of records. If this also is to be nonsidered it would require several hundred thousand dollars additional for all this work. Selectman Aitken believes these pieces of work should be carried forward and the payment extended over a period of years through the issuance of bonds.
