



Value of Vegetables in Diet Without going into definite figures it may be stated that the food value of vegetables, such as beans, peas, poatoes, sweet corn, beats and carrots. s very high. When considered from the standpoint of the food value of the crop that may be produced on a given area of land, beans, beets and carrots are ahead of almost any other garden crop. One-tenth acre planted entirely to carrots will yield about s ton, and in energy this would be equal to about 370 pounds of average beef. One-tenth acre of beets would also yield about a ton and be equal to 880 pounds of average beef. One-tenth acre of lima beans would yield about 120 paunds of dry beans, equal to about 220 pounds of beef.
