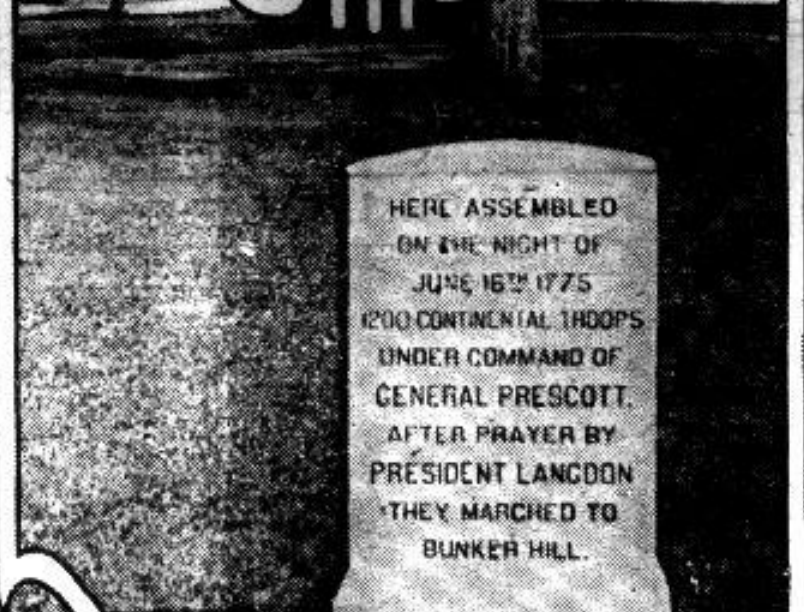

New Facts About Bunker Hill

There are many odd as well as unfamiliar facts in regard to the battle of Bunker Hill, the "dash of the Revolution," fought June 17, 1775.

At the war council the day before the battle younger officers proposed 99 rounds of ammunition for each man. An older one, a "noted hunter," probably Israel Putnam, scoffed at the proposition, saying:

Not a Flag Displayed. Both British and provincial flags flying in the breeze and American officers in uniform are depicted in some pictures of the battle of Bunker Hill, yet men who were in the battle declare not a flag was displayed by either side and not one American, from private to major general, wore anything but civilian garb.

It was a wonderful proof of the farmer's courage and the soldier's valor. The battle was fought on the 17th of June, 1775, at the foot of Breed's hill, the correct name of the elevation where the battle occurred.

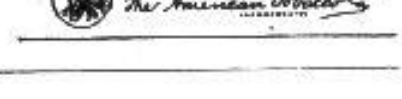
