

Preventing Loss of Identity.

Four Carpenter Unions in San Francisco Punished by the Brotherhood.

"AMERICAN" PLAN UPHELD

Offending Workers Refused to With draw From Rank and File Organization Which Sought to Prolong the Building Trade Strike.

Four carpenter unions in San Francisco have lost their charters because of refusal to withdraw from the rank and file organization which sought to prolong the building trade strike and attempt to incite a new strike when the strike originally ordered was ending in failure. The charters were revoked by the International Brotherhood of Carpenters, the supreme order to which all recognized unions of this class of workmen belong. This marks the definite victory of the agreement of the building trades unions to return to work under the "American plan," as demanded by the employers' organzation, and also puts a final quietus on attempts by cliques within the mions to fement fresh labor troubles. The unions did not officially accept the "American plan," but made tacit acceptance of it when they released all their men from strike pledges, alswed them to make their own bargains for their jobs, and dropped the nediation of the walking delegate. Official announcement of the revocation of the four charters was made by W. A. Cole, coast representative of the International Brotherhood of Carpenters, who stated that the new oranization would be formed to redace those whose charters had been anceled. The rank and file-organiza-

ion, however, remains, though shorn of all union connections, and without the support of the national or international organizations of the carpeners or other building trades workers. Thus the matter simmers down to a onsiderable quarrel between two dividone of organized tabor, and marks an pen breach between the officials of he unions and this party, which is mown as the Conference of Building frades Unions, although it has no authority to use the word "unions" its name.
