In 1579 Sir Francis Drake explored for England the coast considerably made further explorations and Captain Cook, the English navigator, in 1788 landed at Nootks

Thus both Spain and England laid claim to this region. The American rights to this territory were based on the discovery of the Columbia river in 1792 by Captain Robert Gray, who sailed from Boston in the ship Columbia to open up fur trade. Many American fur traders followed and in 1811 John Jacob Astor, the head of the Pacific Fur company, established a settlement called Astoris at the mouth of the Columbia.

By 1843 a decided flow of emigrants from the East travelled over the Oregon Trail from Kansas City to the Columbia river, and thus into Oregon. The trip over this route occupied about three months and the settiers generally travelled in large parties to withstand any possible attacks from Indians. American settlers became so numerous that the United States actively laid claim to this region. Spain had been forced to withdraw any rights she may have had when Florida was ceded in 1819. 


