





The Western inhabitants, however, were left to their own resources and accordingly organized their own government. Resenting the attitude of Utah they petitioned to be annexed to California. In 1859 the Comstock Lode was discovered and Nevada had ts own mining beom. Populaion immediately grew by leaps and bounds and in 1861 Nevada was formed into a separate terlitory. 


